BROADCAST Central is located at Aeolian Hall, 42nd Street and Fifth Avenue, New York City. Every feature of this station is unique, novel and an advance over anything of the kind ever before attempted. Two programs are transmitted simultaneously on different wavelengths. one on 405 meters with the identifying call letters WJY, (the other on a 455 meter wavelength, signing off as WJZ.) This makes necessary two studios, two amplifying systems, two transmitters and two aerials.

This station has its own private system of wires for connecting with the station entertainment and unusual feature numbers which cannot be brought to the station studios. A cable through the heart of the musical and theatrical district, with frequent outlet boxes and a permanent connection at Studio "D" in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, makes possible easy connection to any hall or theatre. The program in Aeolian Hall, the famous hall of the Aeolian Company and known in this newest adaptation as Studio "C," can also be put on at any time.

The Station is near the Raritan River, about one and one-half miles from Bound Brook, New Jersey, and three miles from New Brunswick, New Jersey. It is connected by means of private wires to the studios and control room of Station WJZ, Aeolian Hall, 33 West 42nd St., New York City, thirty-five miles away.

The Station has an antenna power of approximately 50 kilowatts. Two complete transmitting sets are provided, one of which is used for regular broadcasting, and the other for short wave broadcasting. Spare equipment is also provided for the main broadcasting set, so that should any portion of it fail, a spare unit can be placed in service instantly. Each of the transmitting sets requires 250 KW power imput.

The main set used for broadcasting comprises a number of 10 KW watercooled oscillator tubes, with a larger group of similar tubes functioning as modulators. The incoming signal from New York, over the wire lines, is amplified by means of 5-watt and 50 watt balanced audio frequency amplifiers.

The short wave transmitter is similar in design to the regular broadcasting transmittor, and will be used for special long range re-broadcasting experiments.

The regular broadcasting transmitter is connected to a "T" antenna having a flat top 220-feet long, and a lead-in 250 feet in length. This antenna is supported by two 300-foot steel towers placed 700 feet apart. The grounding system is located directly beneath the antenna, and consists of six radial overhead feeder wires which terminate in underground "star-fish" ground connections. The antenna is designed and operated in a fashion which results in exceedingly high radiation efficiency and accounts for the excellent transmission characteristics of this station, which have already been amply demonstrated in preliminary experimental tests.

The wire lines from New York to the station are entirely in underground or over-head cable, thus assuring the maximum reliability. They have been specially arranged to provide undistorted transmission and low noise level, (that is, silent operation.) The entire

circuit consists of thirty-six miles of #13 gauge paper cable, a number of pairs being provided so that in case of the break-down of one circuit, others will be instantly available.

The main power supply for the station is provided by service from two different power plants of the Public Service Company of New Jersey so that in the event of failure of power from one source of supply a second is available. In fact, throughout the entire design of the station all possible precautions have been taken to insure continuity of service.

reliable daylight broadcasting service to cities within 200-400 miles. Thus, reports have been received from Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Boston, Cleveland and similar points to the effect that good daylight reception is obtained. At night the station gives practically local service at points 500-1000 miles distant, according to reports received from such cities as Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Columbus. Excellent reception is also reported from Chicago. In the New York metropolitan district the station gives excellent service in all parts of the city and suburban districts, with extremely few reports to the effect that the signals are inconveniently powerful, even comparitively close to the station. The location at Bound Brook was very carefully picked, by preliminary calculations to give a maximum of service with a minimum of interference in the metropolitan area.

Since this station is connected by wire to the control room at Aeolian Hall in the center of New York City, it is possible to broadcast from it not only programs originating within New York, but also those reaching the control room over private wires to Washington, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Schenectady, Springfield, and Boston. These wire lines have recently been extended through Utica, Syracuse, Rochester, and Buffalo. In this way a great fund of splendid broadcasting programs will be collected for transmission to the American public.

It is expected that the station will have a reliable night range enabling it to reach into all parts of the United States, east of the Mississippi River. It is also anticipated that the station will frequently be heard west of the Mississippi, and on the West Coast, although it must be remembered that the time difference between the West and East Coasts is such that 8 to 11 p.m. on the East Coast corresponds to 5 to 8 p.m. on the West Coast, and it is probable that only when night has fallen over the entire country, will the waves from the station carry through satisfactorily to the West Coast. The Station has already been heard in San Diego. Thus, we may expect that in midwinter the hours from 7 to 8 p.m. on the West Coast will be very suitable for hearing the New York programs being broadcast between 10 and 11 p.m. New York time. Mail has also been received from numerous parts of Mexico.


The Station, which will use the well-known call letters W-J-Z and which will operate on a wave length of 455 meters or a frequency of 660 kilocycles, represents a great and unique step forward in giving reliable service of the highest technical and program merit to a large portion of the population of the United States and Canada.

We expect to begin operating this new station more or less regularly within the next few weeks and I would suggest that the press be watched carefully for further notices.

It is hoped that you will advise us frequently of your criticism or other comment as to our programs or reception in your locality as it is only through your comments that we get an accurate idea of your wishes.
