OUR CONTROL OPERATORS under Hardy Hayes send out 333 Gospel programs from our studios every week. *We know where these programs are heard, for some who listen write.*

The map which shows where letters came from last year has markers in one hundred countries including one at the North Pole and one at the South Pole.

In April 1960 fifty-five countries sent letters to Casilla 691, our Quito Post Office box, to tell us they listen to our programs.

THOSE WHO WRITE ARE MORE THAN JUST A FEW.

The last annual letter month brought 11,904 letters to the Wallop Memorial Building, the home of the Correspondence Department.

In the one month of April—just an ordinary month—2,955 people wrote that they had tuned us in.

The total for last year was 41,058 letters from those who heard us in one of the languages used on the Gospel Broadcasts.

34% of the letters in all languages are from non Christians.

They ask for the giveaways, for literature and information, for a song request to be honored on some program, for prayer, for advice and for spiritual help. We do all we can to meet the individual need.



NANCY WOOLNOUGH, who directs the work of the correspondence Department, reads each English letter from the daily mail and tabulates the information.

Statistics relating to letter response are taken from these records.

She marks excerpts which will interest and encourage the staff.

According to the programs mentioned in the letters she assigns each one to the staff members most concerned for reading and answering.

With each reply goes some kind of Gospel witness. It may be a tract or a personal letter from one of the missionaries answering questions or explaining God's plan for saving lost men.

Prayer requests from the listeners letters are presented at the daily prayer meeting.

Some of those who write receive one of the correspondence Bible studies used by the Bible Institute of the Air to introduce their students to systematic Bible study.

PROGRAM DEPARTMENT

Program personnel are pleased with the results of a change made in the World Radio Chapel, our largest studio. The acoustical treatment was modified in a way which is expected to give better listening to our radio audience.

HCJB listeners, friends and relatives contributed to the purchase of the new Telefunken microphone which has just arrived. It is designated as the second Henry Woolnough Memorial Microphone.

ENGINEERING DEPARTMENT

Engineers Art Larson and Phil Turrell have completed the modification of the long wave transmitter increasing it from 20,000 to 50,000 watts. This transmitter carries our Spanish programs beamed to the local audience.

EVANGELISM

A special service was recently held for the baptism of thirteen new converts including two prisoners who heard the Gospel and accepted the Lord in the penitentiary. They were given special permission to come to the station compound for the baptismal service. They then returned to finish their term of imprisonment. At the same service a member of the Quito Symphony Orchestra and his wife testified to their faith and received baptism.

RIMMER MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

The admissions office reports for the month just finished, "We treated 154 in-patients in our 24 adult and 6 children's beds." Nurse June Wade's records show that during the same period 750 patients were treated in Out Patient and Emergency and that 60 prospective mothers attended the pre-natal clinic each Tuesday.

BIBLE INSTITUTE OF THE AIR

The fourth edition of our Spanish course on "Knowing the Bible" was run off on our own multilith press.

The enrollment of students in Bible Institute of the Air courses has passed the 10,000 mark. This includes students registered in their first course as well as some registered for their tenth.

RADIO CIRCLE

A friend in Grand Rapids recently gave this department 2,200 speakers to be used in building that many more pre-tuned radios to work as mechanical missionaries in Ecuadorean homes.

RADIO STATION HOXO

HOXO, The Voice of the Isthmus, Panama City, the radio station jointly operated by the Latin America Mission and the World Radio Missionary Fellowship, recently changed its studio locality by moving from an underground location to larger studio space on the second floor of a neighboring apartment building. These larger and more convenient quarters provide increased facility for better broadcasting.
