Leutz built Cutler one of his famed "Seven Seas" sets which is still in use- its musical reproduction is so fine that Cutler refuses to replace it with a more modern superhet, which of course, would be a better DXer log totals 900 with about 500 of the more difficult catches verified ... Cutler has been very successful arranging spoctular broadcasts for the NNRC from large stations, which have done much to advertise the club and enhance its prestige- WKAQ, KSL, KVOO, IR5 and KNX are among those that have whole-heartedly co operated with Cutler in his efforts to arrange unusual programs ... incidentally, during the first LR5-NNRC DX, Cutler sent a cablegram to Manager A.B. Dougall scon after the program began, giving quality of reception, etc 14 minutes later he heard his mossage read over the air at Buenes Airest Cutler was responsible for the fine KNX-Pan American NNRC program last year which carried a message from Postmaster General Farley prophesying the early extension of the air route southward to New Zoaland (pionoer tests were recently completed) ... that certainly was a great scoop for the MNRC! ... and, through the efforts of Cutlor and Captain Hollweg of the U.S. Navy, the hourly time signal which you hear on WOR and KSL was instituted in both stations with the NNRC given credit for this notable achievement.... Aside from radio, Dick's hobbies are hunting, fishing, and reading. Has over 400 tomes, including the encyclopedia...He gives credit for much of his DX success to his wife -- for Dick is such a sound sleeper that he doesn't hear the alarm clock at 3:30 A.M. and Mrs. Daneker has to root him out of bed. First became interested in DX in 1929, when he had a Zenith radio. He had a job which brought him home about 2 A.M., and he would stay up a while and see what he could hear. Then he gave up DX in 1930, and was on the wagon until 1935, when he bought a Grunow radio, and then he began to go to town. Present log is 871 broadcast band, and 356 short wave. Has veries from 27 countries on broadcast, and short wave veries from 56 countries. Has heard all continents on short wave, and all continents except Asia on broadcast. Dick's best DX night was on January 10 last year. He started in by picking up 4YA, Dunedin, New Zealand, the first TP he had ever heard. Not being content with one TP, he started ... scouting around for more, and before the night was over, he had picked up 7 TPs, of which 5 are verified. On two of the stations, signals were R8. Dick advises that the best way to get the TPs is to park on their frequency and wait. They fade as much as 15 minutes at a time. Since October, 1939, has been using a Hallicrafter SX24, which he says is the best on the market, for the money, bar none. Uses a 100-foot long antenna, 30 feet high, and runs NE by SW....Joined the MNRC as a result of seeing Director Harold Robinson's picture in All-Wave Radio, and since he and Harold worked in the same mill at the time, got to talking with him, and Harold induced him into joining the MRC. Dick has now been to two WOR-MRC broadcasts, and two conventions, and says he wouldn't give up his MRC membership for the world. His only suggestion for the improvement of the club is more members' reports and comments, together with more DX tips. Claims this has been neglected this year -- so come on you DXers, and let's build up this department.......

LET'S GET ACQUAINTED

Introducing in this issue of the bulletin, W.P. Daugherty, D.D.S. of Ottawa, Illinois. We learn from Treasurer Townley that Dr. Daugherty has been a member of the Club for more than two years now. During that time however, we have heard from him only occasionally; a fact we regret exceedingly since he writes such a swell: letter. Nevertheless, it is pleasant to know that the Doc is a real DXer at heart and a loyal NNRCer to boot.

Loctor Daugherty has been DXing since 1931. His first receiver was a Scott. Now he has an eleven-tube Philco, an R.C.A. and an DW-3. The R.C.A. is really an A.C.R. communications set and of the three is favored most for hauling in those distant aerial voices. Concerning his short wave dialing propensities, the Doctor volunteers that he hears just about everything the other fellow does. Ottawa, a town of 16,000 inhabitants, is 85 miles southwest of Chicago, half-way between the Windy City and Peoria and represents a two-hour trip from the Illinois metropolis... Doc says he is amazed at the scarcity of DX fans in Ottawa- in so far as he has been able to determine there aren't any besides himself ... the Doc, by the way, is a virile young man of 42 Surmers and he has two hobbies- Ding and golf... we know from first-hand information that the molar preserver or yanker as the case may be, is a first-class dial twister ... as for his proficiency at the Scotch pastime- well, we'll have to wait for developments... it seems that Doc has flung down a challenge to Prexy Potts. Rooster Hahn. Bill's biggest DX thrill occurred last Winter when he heard five Buenes Aires stations in ONE HOUR. . . . besides spending . at loast five hours a week DXing during the wee small hours, he manages to find time . to do a swell job as car-checker and shipping clerk for the Rath Packing Co. one of the largest independent packers in the country ... every time Bill checks a car for Newark he thinks of the good old NNRC; every time he checks one for Brooklyn he thinks how nice it would be to live in Baltimore ... is now twenty-six years old and has been married four years...Bill gots a big kick out of the bulletin and thinks the "WHO'S WHO" are swell.... we hope he likes this one particularly.

GEORGE DEL GRANDE...Born and bred in Jersey City -- otherwise known as The Hague is 26 years old....married and happy, which makes him one in a million.... Expects to become a father April 12. 1940 ... What are YOUR plans for next year?... Jobs being as scarce as they are. George is now working as a hod carrier ... Everyone else on the job is Irish, and every day George has to defend verbalky and physically Il Duce ... Formerly belonged to the Naval Reserves, and within the space of four years visited Puerto Rico as well as many American ports. See America First is the Del Grande motto. Has been in 28 states and one of his ambitions is to see the remaining 20. Another is to verify all states and U.S. possessions on Broadcast Band, and all continents and as many countries as possible on SW. WHO'S WHO IN THE MARC - By Varrelman

JOHN DE MEYER, Lansing, Michigan.... The pride and joy of the General Motors organization.... Has been employed in the Oldsmobile Division for the past 17 years and at present is foreman of plant maintenance.... Is married, and has a son 12 years old who is not yet a DXer. His pop, however, has been a DXer so far back he can't remember when he was not a DXer....He, like "Topsy." wasn't born in DX....he just growed up. John was playing with wireless before the start of World War I, and had to go off the air temporarily when the United States entered the war. Then, early in 1920, John started construction of a real 1-tuber. Since most of the parts had to be made by hand it took three months to build, but he was rewarded for his work by hearing a portion of the FIRST commercial broadcast ever sent out by KDKA -- which was in November, 1920. Other DX in those days was FWX and 6KW in Cuba, and KFI and KHJ on the Pacific Coast. KFI and KHJ are easy now, but back in "the old days" you had to sit up most of the night to hear them, and it was accordingly a real thrill. De Meyer did not begin verifying until 1930, and though his total number of veries is only 100, they represent 40 countries and all continents. If John had been as interested in U. S. DX as in foreign, his verification log would be an impressive one, for on the BCB he now has veries from 25 Australians, 22 Asiatics, 21 Eyropeans, 15 South Americans, 2 from Africa, and of course the U. S. ones. How do you like those 22 from Asia? In 1934, John began SW DX in a mild way, and now has 1000 veries from 147 countries. John's biggest DX thrill occurred on the morning of October 10, 1934, when he arose at 5:00 A.M., as usual, to see if he could snare Australia. The previous night he had left the receiver set on WJR, Detroit, 750 kcs. He turned on the set to let it warm up, and imagine his surprise to hear Oriental music coming rolling out of the speaker at R9. He thought it was WJR with a special program....but it was JOBK-2, Japan. That morning he reports, practically every frequency of the band containing an Oriental, came in just like a local. Besides logging Japanese, he pulled in KGOA, China, on 660; JODK-2, Korea, on 900; and JOAK, Manchuria, 650. The next morning, October 11, was almost as good. Never before, or since, says, John, has he heard anything like it. We remember Roy Licari telling us of amazing reception from Australia one morning -- we wonder if it was on the same date. How about it. Roy? John has used many types of receivers and antennas in his long career in DX. but at present is using a Scott and has used Scott receivers exclusively for the past 8 years. For DX, John believes a good communications type receiver is better. Although he has been an MARCer only a year, says he likes the features of the club, and has an especially good word for Earl Robert's Short Wave column....

RALPH DENGIER, Englewood, Colorado...a Pennsylvania Dutchman out in the wild and wooly West....that is almost as bad as a cowboy from Brooklyn....Ralph is 26 years old and married....when we asked him what his biggest thrill was (we expected him to say a 10-watter in Florida), he said "meeting my wife"...he'd rather have a good feminine catch than a good DX one ... wotte DXer! ... it's a good thing Joe Brauner don't feel that way -- Joe, you know, has more than a thousand good DX catches .. . Ralph is a telegraph operator on the Donver and Salt Lake Railroad and says it is just one of the peachiest railroads running from Denver to Salt Iako City ... he has traveled all ever the western states except Utah and Nevada, but, whether on a pass or not he didn't say ... lived within a few miles of the Canadian border for four yoars but novor strayed across the line ... this main hobby is DX; next, cating ice cream ... Ralph started to DX back in 1934 ... he used to lose a lot of sleep just listening to soo how far out he could got ... then one night an announcer asked for roports and promised to sond a verification ... Ralph didn't know what a veri was anymore than any of us did when we first began ... that veri started the ball rolling log currently stands at 475 heard with 250 verified on the BCB....short wave heard 115 and 37 verified.....formerly used a Phileo and now has an Airline set....hopes to get a Super Skyrider next season, then maybe the clusive TAs and TPs will come in.... farthest catch so. far, is LRL. Buonos Aires....biggest DX ambition is to log Alaska... says Ralph: "I think the NNRC is a very fine club. When I decided to join a radio outfit throc years ago, I got a sample bulletin from all the loading clubs and the NNRC looked best to me. I have never been sorry for my choice ... and needless to say, we're not a bit sorry Ralph chose the NNRC.

AUBREY V. A MENDELL (JUST JAKE) FIELD, San Diego; California...born in staid old Boston 42 years ago ... raised at even staider Northfield, Vermont ... after graduating from high school, wont to Ontario and landed a job with the Canadian Telephone Co... worked there six years, then joined the Michigan State Telephone Co, in mintenance division ... in 1920 Jake took a three weeks' vacation in California ... the balmy air got him and his vacation was extended to a three-months' leave of absence; then to six months; one year and then two years...at the end of two years of California bliss he sent in his resignation to Michigan ... his jobs since then have ranged from grocery clerk to a motion picture extra....now employed by the Ranch Co. manufacturers of pricing systems, as manager of their San Diego branch...is both married and happy, admitting that Alamoda (Just May) is a model DXor's wife- splendid cook, irwaculate housekeeper, considerate mother and good sport (hey, Jake, Mrs, Field should join the club, too) ... Milt's DXing fell by the wayside ... all his spare time was taken up with the many duties that befall an NNRC executive secretary (ask Jimmy Hart and Pete McKenna)... the highlight of the Fleischman dial-twisting saga has been his foreign catches; hearing Poste Parisien and the Argentine stations gave him much pleasure also enjoyed working on the WOR programs, ... biggest thrill of all, though, was hoaring Owner A.B. Now using a 1934 Atvater Kent and does some SW DXing... He says, however: "I got more of a thrill logging KYOS, Morced, Calif. this morning, than logging VPD2, Suva, Fiji Islands, day before yesterday, or VKZME or RINV ... Carl's SW log contains 147 verified in 37 countries and he has already qualified for the club's ST certificate and will be awarded No. 1 ... Carl is one of our most enthusiastic and dyed-in-thewool DXors and it is a real pleasure to have him associated with us.
