HCODA took more than eleven months to reply ... . many Central and South American stations are noted for either being slow to answer or not answering at all... has used an 83 Radiola, a tw-tube Stewart-Warner, a 12-tube RCA-Victor and now has a 15-tube, all-wave Scott ... Sergio says the last-named set is very good and that he has never had any trouble with it ... Senor Gonzalez has been a member of our Club since July, 1937, and has been a member of our Board of Directors for more than a year now...he joined through the efforts of Ric Fales, Roslyn, N.Y., and his only regret is that he didn't become an NNRCer sconer...says Sergio: "I am very proud to belong to such a fine radio club and regret that I do not know personally, the many good friends that belong to it ... feels that the history of independence and commercial relations of Cuba with the U.S. are so bound together that regardless of the distance, Cubans feel very close to us Americans. ... Sowell, manager of WLAC, invited him to personally breadcast a DX period ... it went over big and Cappie is now a permanent fixture with his NNRC DX period every Sunday morning at 12.45, EST.... Cappic has done a fine job for the club tolling the whole country about our pioneer DX organization and he means it from his heart when he says "The NNRC is the finest radio club in the world"

LLOYD SHANNON HAHN, better-known to his fellow-members by the nom-de-plume, THE ROOSTER. This is one fowl who should know the answer to the one, "Why does a chicken cross the street". However, he

recently confessed it was still an enigma to him.

Iloyd first saw the light of day on July 20,1905 and claims to have derived most of his pleasure since in the sheer joy of living. He has lived in Baltimore all his life(to date) and expects to spend his declining years (which we are of the opinion are already upon him in the same city, or nearby. The Rooster has three brothers and only one sister living and all of them have been members of the club at one time or another. He has also had several whirls at working in shipyards, as a pipe-fitter's helper, shippainter, and bilge-cleaner. Worked for a while as a hair-spinner, when our country took over the Vaterland and renamed it the Leviathan, this hair being used in the re-upholstering necessary. Then, he was office boy for a contracting painter, worked in the mailing department of a large wholesale house, The American Wholesale Corporation, took a job sanding paint-brush handles, made cartons at the American Tobacco Co. and also worked as a paper-hanger several times. Then, feeling the call to the soil, he would periodically quit whatever job he had each June and go back to the farm, working out by the day as a field hand, doing everything but playing nurse-maid to the cows. He recalls having once cut corn for 21 days in a row and admits he couldn't do it today. Sold buns and doughn uts from house-to-house for several days, was errand-boy for the Whitaker Paper company and, among his other jobs, was working with the American Hammered Piston Ring Company when his call came to come to the aid of Uncle Sam's overworked mailmen.

The Rooster has been a member of the NNRC for about ten years and still maintains it has meant more to him in the life-long friendships he has acquired than anything it could possibly do for him in a DX way. Among his more than 1100 verifications, all on the regular bob, he has at least one verification from all continents, among his prizes being those from China, Japan, Alaska, Morocco, Tasmania and the many from Australia, New Zealand, Europe and the South American countries. ... Another ex-DXer who has slipped badly.

LOUIS HAHN, Rutherford, N.J...our genial "Lieutenant"...born in Germany 44 years ago but came to this country at the ago of 18 ... after taking a law course, he became a court clork and later a district attorney's clerk...in May, 1916, Louis joined the National Guard of New York and served on the Mexican border for nine months...he continued in the service and when the United States entered the world War rose from the rank of private to lieutenant ... at present is personnel officer of the 212th Coast Artillery .... Lou had quito an extensive musical education in his youth and for 21 years was a church organist ... and wo assure you, that he can still "tickle the iveries" in a very nifty manner...Lou joined the NNRC in 1930 when he had a log of 192 stations; at present he has 825- quite an improvement, we admit, but- we are certain that he could have had a much bigger log if he had kept his mind off that vamp, Ophelia,...has heard JOCK, Japan, and CNR, Rabat, Morocco, as well as eleven Luropeans on the BCB, not to mention twelve South .mericans ... Ed is now using a 1938 Marconi three-band set which has plenty of power and good selectivity ... has used several Crosleys in the past, the last one getting credit for all his veries ... started DXing back in the days when WREO and WOK were active, and when WCX and WJR used the same frequency but did not begin to verify until XEW came on the air. . . . a report brought that station's four-color veri card and since then Ed has vorified everything... his biggest thrill was tuning in FOUR Argentina stations without any advance information ... best catches are Rabat, Morocco and 10BP tuned in at 3 P.M. when they were using but 5 watts!! .... while our Toronto membership is not as large at present as we expect it to be in the future, nevertheless, every member of the Chapter is a live wire ... we're counting on Ed and his gang to help our MEMPER-SHIP DRIVE ... and we know that EVERY TORONTO MEMBER WILL GET A MEMBER!

NICHOLAS J. HOCK is twenty-four years old, has lived in Newark for the past thirteen years and has no regrets about it. . that is something of a record! . . . is a graduate of Newark Tech and interested in architectural design...now working in the office of a Newark transportation company...once installed radios in Brooklyn... single...prefers blonds...started his DX log in 1928 with a Radiola 18...two years later switched to a Fada 42, with which he logged 383 stations...bought a Hammarlund Comet set in 1934 and now has 667 verified catches of which seventy-eight are 2,000 milers and the average mileage of each station is 913... Nick's biggest thrill was logging ETB, Ethiopia with an R9 signal...has heard weak signals from Australia on the BCB but has not been able to get enough material for verification. . has heard 15 watters in Australia on Sw...is now serving on the SW CPC and has charge of Japan, Australia and the West Indies.

He is single but expects to become a benedict in the near future... Has been DXing ten years on and off but did not take much interest in it until 1932 when he began verifying ... Biggest thrill was logging 2YA, 2BL and then JOAK-1...All are verified ... Says Frank: "The MWRC has been a great help to me in

my DXing!

RALPH G. HUGHES. our representative on the fair island of Bermuda.... 27 years old and still single...employed by the Admiralty, London, as an established storehouseman in any of the dockyards at home or abroad... this entails the receipt of stores from Ingland or from contractors as the case may be; the custody and preservation of them and the ultimate issuing of them to ships of His Majesty's fleet.... the foreign station assignments are for a period of three years: Ralph may go home for a year or several years, or he may get pushed off to Hong Kong, Singapore or some place like that after being home only a few months..., believes very definitely in striving for good health and accordingly he likes many sports ... plays English football well and is a qualified referee for same ... likes to watch any sport ... other hobbies include the theatre and photography ... Ralph's DX life has been comparatively short ... sent for his first verification (VK3LR) in May, 1937 ... after reporting to a few short wave stations, he began verifying BCB as well....KYW, Philadelphia, supplied his first BCB veri...his interest in DX was aroused by the magazine "All Mave Radio" and he was very sorry to see it cease publication as he considered it the best in its field ... Ralph decided to join the NNRC after hearing Lloyd Hahn and the Baltimore garg on a WFMD program...his log is now at the 320 mark with 236 verified ... best catches are KFKA KFPY KROW KFWB CJCS KGB and KYA ... although he has heard Belfast and France, he hasn't gone after many of the Europeans as he will be returning to England in April and wants to get as many low-powered Cubans and SAs as is possible ... Ralph's first set was a 10-tube RCA and he is now using an RME-69 with DB-20 preselector; the RME has proved to be a very good set .... Ralph maintains that the NURC is by far the best radio club; he has read several other clubs' bulletins and as a result, considers ours much superior ... now regarding Bermuda ... . Ralph says it is a nice place for a holiday, away from the hustle and bustle of the city and that the weather is by far the best thing about the island .... other than dancing at the various hotels, there is very little amusement in the evenings ... just one or two cinemas ... a very expensive place to live with very poor transportation; facilities ... Later, when he tuned in WBZ, 25 miles away, he thought he was "getting out" very nicely ... Other "real DX catches" he logged in those good old days were WGY and KDKA ... Eventually graduated to a one-tube set with WD-12 type tube sticking cut of the top and a couple of dry cells and a 222 volt "B" battery on the side (Gad, what memories that brings back) ... This set was perfect--it could bring in Chicago: that was distance! ... Now Jack uses a Philco 116X and spans the world at will with this eleven-tube superhot, all wave, high fidelity receiver... Has 400 stations verified on BCB and SW... Jack is 32 years old and has lived in Elmwood most of his life...Dabbles in philately and likes to travel...New York is his favorite city and the MNRC his favorite club. (Harry E. Varrelman)

STANLEY IBAUGH, Norristown, Penna.... a pative of the Keystone State, Stan was born in Rockport, 22 years ago...at an early age his folks moved to Pottstown and then to Norristown....Stan first became interested in broadcast band DXing in 1927 and in short waves the following year ... his biggest DX thrill came in 1935 when Stan logged stations in Java, Greenland, Iceland and several other foreign countries ..... he has a log of 800 stations and 461 verifications... has used the following receivers: Music Master, a two-tube Docere, Atwater-Kent, a Phileo and still another Philco... Stan is a Sunday school socretary and a member of the National Honor Society, National Geographic Society ... . ho bolongs to the Norristown Radio Club. the Norristown Vocational Society and the Short wave League ... also attends the Philadelphia School of Wireless, where he is taking a course in broadcast operating....he became interested in The Newark News Radio Club when he heard a DX special dedicated to it ... says Stan: "I don't he sitate to say that the NNRC is the best club of its kind; it does more for its members than any club I know of ... acknowledging that much-appreciated expression, we want to say that we are happy that Stan saw fit to choose our organization when he decided to join a DX club.

ARTHUR JOHNSON, who resides at what he claims is Fort Hamilton but to this Brooklynite, he lives in BROOKLYN and regardless of whether he lives in Fort Hamilton, the said Mr. Johnson was born in Brocklyn (he can't deny that) 24 years ago ... has lived in Staten Island, N.Y.; Westport, Conn., and Fall River, North Dakota.... Art has made two trips to Europe in the past decade ... studied electrical engineering in school ... is now working in an insurance office ... it sure is great what an education Will do for you! ... started to DX in 1929 more or less accidentally by listening late one night to a station he thought was a local but which turned out to be good old KSL of Salt Lake City ... after this first great DX feat (the best catch any Brooklynite has made in three years), Art decided that the old Colonial receiver must really be something, so he set out to see just what he could log....he was amazed to hear Chicago coming in so good (wish we could get Chicago: we can't get past WAAB and Boston, but boy, have we heard it! and have we been hearing about that feat!) .... then Art heard TRUF in Florida on a test asking for reports; he wrote them and it was from WRUF he received his first veri- that eventful date was April 13, 1929, which is just four days removed from an even ten years of DX at the time this is written...in 1931 Art built a Pilot kit SW receiver and then began to DX on SW....he has used a variety of receivers since then and at present is pulling them in with an 18-tube Midwest with a regenerative preselector, a Cosman Communications Receiver, a 7-tube Philco and the new Hallicrafters Skyrider 5-10.... RUSSELL N. JOHNSON, Saskatchevan Club Director at Saskatoon....born in London. England February 18, 1900 ... went through Sir William Bovlase College at the tender age of 16, beat it from school and went to work in a London auto factory....later was engaged in manufacturing aircraft parts...got disgusted with being shut up and enlisted in the Royal Air Force in 1917 ... every time Russ was up in the air and looked over the cockpit, he wondered what held the old "garbage can" together ... was invalided out of the Air Force in 1918 and still not having had enough, he re-enlisted in the Gordon Highlanders...upon his discharge in 1919. Russ thought he might make a good salesman but fate thought otherwise, so he decided to go to Canada, the land of "milk and honey"...arrived at St. John's, N.B. in April of 1920 and then immediately went to Saskatchewan and started farming ... after seven years of it, Russ decided that the milk was sour and the honey had flies in it, so he moved south to the city of Saskatoon where he has lived ever since ... Russ sustained a great sorrow in 1933 when his wife died, leaving four children motherless....he re-married in 1934 to whom he claims is the nicest girl in the world ... Russ and the second Mrs. Johnson became dad and mother to a wee miss on December 31, 1938- a swell way to end the year! ... regarding DX- Russ bought his first radio in 1929, a King 5-tube battery set...the following year he bought an RCA-Victor, 10-tube, TRF set which he still uses and in 1936 got a Miller converter for SW....the BCB log stands at 861.... the SW totals 109, commercial stations only...uses a ship's antenna 300 feet long and 50 feet high running East to West...best catches are XGOA, LR5, PRF3, WKAQ and six JOs...only verifies overseas catches...we asked Russ about the U.S. and Canadian programs and stations he usually tunes in for entertainment...he stated he listens to U.S. broadcasters mostly but that the CBC is slowly but surely blanketing every U.S. station it can and feels this is a kind of radio dictatorship ... in Russ' opinion, the NNRC is the finest club in the world, not only for DXing but for actual friendship...he has letters from members which he considers priceless and he is continually making new friends....first heard of the MNRC through our good friend, Fred Janssen of California and joined in 1933 and has read and enjoyed the bulletins ever since...a Director since 1934, Russ doesn't like the petty bickering that crops up so often in the DX fraternity and is grateful our Club doesn't indulge in it.... we kidded Russ about living in an "outpost of civilization" and he came right back with the statement that Saskatoon has a population of 42,000, has street cars, buses and all modern conveniences...it isn't necessary for us to state here that we are very happy Russ is a member of our Club and it is indeed gratifying to know that we can always count upon his undivided and loyal support.

Lafayette, French hero of our Revolutionary War, while passing through the town noticed its grace and beauty; it so reminded him of his native Havre de Grace in France that he so named it, meaning Harbor of Grace and Beauty....the town is now famous for its fast and beautiful horses....getting back to Steve....ho is 15 years old and a junior at the Havre do Graco High School .... says Stove: "I am single and intend to remain so for some time" ... after he finishes school, Steve wants to get into the radio business in some shape or form ... maybe as a service man, engineer or operator ... would like to have his own ham station ... although Steve's DX career has been a short one, it has nevertheless been interesting ... he began by listening to the more powerful Cubans and Mexicans on the old family receiver ... then the DX tips from KDKA got him really interested and he bought an all-wave set....worked the short waves in 1936-37 and then swung to the BCB side of the dial ... his BCB log was under 200 at the beginning of 1938; now, due to MNRC specials, frequency checks, etc., it has passed the 400 mark and is speeding toward the half-thousand mark....bost catches are KWJJ, the 500 watt Oregonian ( a second Kraemer with no 100 watt Coasters), and LRI, Buenes Aires ... Steve heard these on a' 7-tube Silver which is chiefly his DXing set; however, he occasionally uses an old Philco....other hobbies are stamp collecting and phonograph recordings.... Stove would liko to have some programs from foreign stations this season and also from some of the many U.S. daytimors ... says he: "I believe the NNRC is the best club of its kindit cortainly puts out the best and most helpful bulletin ... naturally, we're glad to hoar Stove say that and we hope he will continue to find the Club and its activities holpful with his DXing. ALEX KEENAN of Roanoke. Virginia... a member of the club for eight years and as enthusiastic as ever ... "I have always been proud to be an MNRCer and no organization I know of gives so much for so little! writes Mr. Keenan ... is now entering his 60th year...has been associated with the steel industry for the past 45 years....his first job was with the Phoenix Iron Works, a concern incorporated in 1796 and still going ... Mr. Keenan then became a stool inspector and during the World War was with the Submarine Boat Corp. Newark, where he inspected much of the steel used in constructing 150 vessels...since 1930 has been assistant shop superintendent for the Virginia Bridge Co. a U.S. Steel subsidiary ... happily married, with five living children and a granddaughter...first began DXing "way back when" ... used an Atwater-Kent and his greatest thrill in these early days, was hearing CZE, Mexico City, and CZE is a long time back in radio history...still uses an Atwater-Kent and has logged more than 600 stations...one of his best catches is KLCN. Blytheville, Ark. hoard when they first went on the air and when the announcer stated they were using 72 watts and an "old haywire contraption" ... heard KBTM, the 100 watter at Paragould, Ark. at 4.30 on an August afternoon and has a letter from KBTM saying that everyone in the studio danced for joy at being heard 850 miles away at that hour...never logged Europo but has listoned to an occasional Jap without gotting enough to verify.... likes to tune in WOR and when he does so invariably thinks of the MNRC...Mr. Koenan sonds best wishes to all his fellow-members ... We know our officers and members will join with us in felicitating this vetoran and valued NNRCer!

HOWARD KEMP, Waterbury, Conn... probably better known as the Brass City Nite Owl ... 20 years old and a native Connecticut Yankee ... single ... works as an apprentice electrician with a large manufacturing concern...of his job, Howard says: "It is rather dirty but after three years I will be out of the grit ... takes his DXing very seriously and gets a great kick when he adds a new station...log stands at 807 heard and 498 verified and needs only two more veries for a Super Acc cortificate ... Howard's first set was a ton-tubo RCA-Victor; now uses a six-tube, all-wave Philco....has been a member of the club for four years ... likes the Connecticut climate but doesn't think he is in a good spot for TA or TP reception. . . . claims Phil Nichols is the tops as an all-around DXcr...most unusual program Howard ever heard was KFOX broadcasting from the streets of Long Beach during an earthquake... also heard Admiral Byrd at Little America on a home-made, two-tube SW set...best BCB catches are 10BP, 10AB, CKMO and HJN...best SW: ZSS, SUZ and CNR...vould like to correspond with other members- address him at 250 Walnut Street, Waterbury, Conn.

AL STOCIE KOEMPEL, Newark.... a native Garden Stater who has never done a bit of work in a garden in his entire life ... the "garden" to Al means Madison Square Garden ... also claims a guy name Carden is vice-president of the United States ... Al is 31, married and has two children ... after finishing his schooling, he went into the jewelry business but the firm wouldn't let him take any samples home so he became a baker, or if you prefer, a dough puncher....joined the Club back in 1928 in the boom days of DX ... it happened this way- Al had an 8-tube Majestic and one evening when he was cating his dinner, asked his wife to put on number 70 (Al says they didn't call it the "dial" in those days) so he could hear Ford Frick give the baseball scores .... instead, Mrs. Koompol tuned in WTIC and when she told him she couldn't get WOR but had a station up in Phil Nichols' Hartford, Al listened in and when he heard the call he got so excited he wrote, just to let the station know he heard thom ... five days later he received a verification and that started him on the DX trail (looks as if Mrs. Koompel is the DXer of that family) ... to-day, Al has verified 813 stations, including 6 Europeans, 28 Cubans, 7 South Americans, 65 Canadians and 34 Mexicans and needs but a few 2,000 milers for his Silver Ace ... present set is a G.E. 1933 vintage...his big ambition is to hear a TP....biggest DX thrill was pulling in 13 new Coasters (and just think, old Doc Kraemer hasn't been able to get a 100-watter out that way in twolve years) as well as four other new ones on that famous day in DX history, October 12, 1930- one of the best DX nights since the beginning of radio .... IES KRAEMER, Newark... treasurer of our organization for many years and a reasonably good DXer....weighs a mere 206 pounds in his stocking feet....is forty-one and doesn't look a day over forty-five....has been married for fifteen years and has a son. nine years old....for the past fifteen years has been associated with the Fidelity Union Trust Co. of Newark and is now head of its transit department....got interested in IX through a friend and eventually bought a two-tube Harkness reflex with a crystal detector and back in 1922 when he heard Philadelphia, thought it was distance....he also managed to log New Orleans at that time....Bill Schweitzer now claims that DXing is one of Les's lost arts...one time Les thought he heard San Francisco and lost three pounds bragging about his prowess...he lost three more in humility when he discovered that what he actually heard was a Brooklyn station re-broadcasting KPO ... ever since then, Les has been carrying a chip on his shoulder against Brooklyn ... he later bought a Freshman Masterpiece which was a very good set ... even ye scribe, who possessed the same model got good DX with it until the installment collector took it away .... Les then secured an Eagle neutrodyne and with it logged CYJ, Mexico City, the first station that he verified ... when he pulled in his first Coastor, he was so pleased he woke up the entire family and made them listen to the magic words "KGA, Spokano" ... at present is using a 116X Phileo and while he has gotton some good DX, could have done better if he would only stay up once in a while .... Good catches include IR1, IR5, Leipzig and Poste Parisien but no 100 watt West Coasters...Les is one of the original fifty-five charter members, having become treasurer eight years ago, succeeding Hubort R. Ede, radio editor of The News.

MILAN (WZMAX) KRASNICAN, Irvington, N.J....born in dear old Newark in 1923.... moved to "Oivington" at the tender age of one and has lived there ever since ... now in his third year at high school....first became interested in DX in 1937 through the efforts of a friend...incidentally, all of Mil's receivers, from the very first to the present one, have been home-made...maybe that accounts for his good DX--he builds them better than the mass production factories ... as an example of his super DX, lets go back to Milan's first one-tuber 30, with which he pulled in such catches as WOR...hi! hi!...then came a 2-tube Doerlo and this one really worked -- he vorified 12 countries and 3 continents on SW. in about two months.... Moscow and London came in R8-9....then the improving fevor got Mil (it always gets the "wo-make-itourselves" boys) and he ripped the set apart ... and when he put it together again he had a lot of parts he didn't need .... Milan also blew out countless tubes ... , so, in 1938 ho bought a Clippor kit and built it up....verified all continents on SW and brought in 30 countries with loudspeaker volume ... and the boy wonder has used lots of antonnae--everything from an inverted L to a fish pole ... biggest thrill was when TI4NRH read his name and address over the air and he happened to be listening... has also heard part of his report to a Canadian SW being read ... by the way, Milan first heard of the NNRC when he was listening to TI4NRH in May, 1938....how do you like that?....the guy lives five miles from Nevark and he has to go a couple thousand miles to hear about the Club!...in January, 1939, came the calamity....Milan foll and became a ham ... so, he bought a key and built a simple code oscillator and practiced for two solid months -- and we said SOLID ... from this start in January, he could do about 18 words per minute in Fobruary ... he practiced carnestly and stoadily and you have got to give Mil credit for his tenacity and enthusiasm ... regarding the code exam, Mil says if you get nervous and jittery you're bound to flunk....just convince yourself you can and you'll get through O.K ... Milan also says ho was glad to soo the Brooklyn Tigors so thoroughly trounce the Baltimore Boasters in that volley ball game London Wattonal Brookman's Park for the championship of the world!!!!

ROY N. LICARI, a DXer's DXer. . twenty-three and not married-yet. . . Has an LLB degree from Fordham and is now clerking for, a. New York law. firm. .. Lives in Brooklyn. (The Dark Continent) but DXes in Allenwood, N.J... Because he gets to Allenwood but infrequently, he DXes only about once a month ... But what a lot of action he gets out of that one night ... Has heard and verified TWENTY TPs; latest catch being 2CH. Sydney. Australia... In all, has logged and verified 750 stations of which 130 are 2,000 milers. Uses an RCA set and a 420 foot aerial, one of the longost in the club. Is secretary of the Brooklyn Chapter of the NNRC. .. His father, a well-known lawyer, is a candidate for election to Congress and the odds are 5 to 3 he will win... Roy says: "The NNRC gets my vote and dues every time; it is the best radio club in the world!" (UFU)

ROY N. LICARI, as many DXers will recall, was a very successful logger of DX catches, is now a Foist Looie in the U.S. Army. We met may and his mother when he was in town recently on a ten-day furlough. He certainly looks natty in uniform and it is apparent that the outdoor life is agreeing with him.

We recall the time Old Doc Kraemer, Bill Schweitzer and Johnny Sanderson went down to Roy's country place in Allenwood, N.J. to watch Roy bring in the TPs. Not long before, Roy had picked up seven Aussies in one morning, a record we believe which still stands. However, the night we visited Allenwood (25 miles from nowhere), DX conditions were terrible and we couldn't even get Les Kraemer a 100 watt West Coaster. So, I never did hear a TP and Roy never heard the end of the ribbing anent his DX ability.

Roy says that if anyone writes him next year he'll expect to be addressed as "Captain". And if the war lasts until 1945, he's planning on being Major Licari. Roy's pet hope is that one day some of the Baltimore Boosters like Lloyd Hahn and Barney Ahman will be assigned to his command preferably as rookies. That which he has in mind for them is too gruesome to repeat here. But it is needless to anticipate that enjoyable event as the once proud and haughty clam diggers from down along the Chesapeake have literally fallen apart physically and Dingly.

JOSEPH T. LIPPINCOTT, East Vassalboro, Maine ... a native of Philadelphia, the City of Brotherly Love and long a center for Quakers, or to be more correct, the Society of Friends ... . yet, Joe didn't become a Quaker until 1931 ... . then he went to Tufts College for five years to get his B.A. and his theology degree .... Joe became interested in radio when just a lad....at that time he built several small radios, most of them crystal sets but some were two and three-tubers ... like our friend, Doc Kraemer. Joe admits he fell asleep many nights while listening to a crystal set with earphones attached....used to listen to WOO, the Wanamaker station in Philly- the call always sounded very hollow- WOO-700- and in those days, WCAU wasn't much to rave about either ... . Joe also heard the initial program from WLIT although that wasn't its originally assigned call...bought a Majestic in 1929 which brought in DX much better than the home-made affairs....listened to the international tests but didn't have the success that Frank Scott did- all Joe ever got was a faint signal from an Irish station ... with the Majestic, though, Joe added 100 new stations which is rather remarkable when you consider he didn't do any late evening or early morning DXing...best catch on the Majestic was KHQ, Spokane ... went to Drew University in 1930 and 1931 and then went to work as a salesman for three years...in 1934 he went to Tufts and in January, 1935, bought a little 5-tube Silvertone with which he DXed quite a bit...incidentally, with all his DXing, Joe didn't know there were any DX clubs up to this point....with the Silvertone, he brought in 175 stations with the big-three of the West Coast the only near-DX...didn't verify and in fact didn't know what a veri was.. on one occasion he heard a station in Virginia telling about apples; they said to write and a free apple would be sent ... Joe wrote and got his apple ... a few days later a veri card came along....said Joe to himself "The fools, of course I heard them or how could I have written for an apple"...so, he tore up the veri! but he knows better now ... biggest DX thrill, aside from hearing KHQ, was hearing Ingland on SW with his 5-tube set....began to read The Newark Evening News in 1935 because he considered it a very fine paper and in it he read of the MNRC....immediately joined the Club and began to DX in earnest....bought a 7-tube Hallicrafters with which he heard Radio Normandie ... two friends didn't believe it could be done so they listened and heard nothing ... they started to say "I told you so" ... that was at 1.59 A.M. but they had no sooner finished saying it when bing! the station signed on and signals were R6-7....has since heard several other TAs including Nuremburg and Klagenfurt....logged about 30 TPs last season including 100 and 200 watt Australians ... among his 40 TAs the lowest powered is Bordeaux on 1366 kcs...has now heard 766 BCB stations with 409 verified; countries heard, 33...on long wave Joe has heard 18 and on SW has verified 140 catches....besides radio, Joe goes in for stamp-collecting as a hobby whenever he can spare the time devoted to his flock up there in Maine.
