PAUL SAMPSON, Regina, Saskatchewan...and when you say "Regina" pronounce the "i" as "I" and not as "e" and emphasize the "g" ... as for Saskatchewan, get the "Sask" out clearly and then just whistle ... however. Paul was born in Regina and has spent most of his life there....and since the city is several hundred miles from any real body of water. you might wonder how Paul came to be known as "The Tipsy Sailor"...it seems the first time he took a small sailboat out on a small pond the thing capsized; thus "The Tipsy Sailor" ... the gob, who is twenty-eight and decidedly single, first heard of the NNRC through WSM. Nashville, whon they were broadcasting our Club's tips.... Paul joined us as a result of a DX program heard, over KOAC in March, 1934.... although his first veri came from WCCO and carries the ancient date of 1928, Paul really became active in 1934 when he became an NNRCor....log at prosont is 570 heard and 420 verified, received on a 1930 Brushwick and a 1934 RCA Victor t2-tubor ... reception is best in Regina when the weather is from zero to 30'dogrees above: that's in Winter: in Summer, with the thermometer reading 100 in the shade, Paul has had some fine reception, second to none of Winter radio days ... "bcliove it or not" he says, "it is absolutely truo" (Ed. that's amazing for, as you know, the sun absorbs about 70 per cent of radio waves, the reason why DX is customarily a night-time and Winter hobby) not so amazing is the Sailer's remark that "NNRC bulletins are always welcome here for the letters and friendly fouds give them a feeling of individuality to members lacking in other bulletins. The best \$2 a year ever spent by anybody"... Paul's favorite number -- and his lucky one is "13" ... on August 13 one year he sailed a boat numbered 13, walked under a ladder, saw a motion picture titled "Operator 13" ... boy, did he take chances! ... and do you know what happened?....he found a twenty-five cent piece ... further, Paul says that if old Doc Kracmor adopted "13" as his lucky number he might hear that 100 watt Coaster we have all read so much about ... but seriously, Paul is a hard-working member, always trying to further the Club's interest we're fortunate he chose the MNRC as his DX club.

JOHNNIE SANDERSON, Newark....formerly of Glasgow, Scotland...a typical happy Scotsman ... still single ... as a kid, Johnnie was interested in signaling and transmitting messages and when in school was in the signal section of the Boy's Brigade (the brigade is an organization somewhat like the Boy Scouts, but composed of older boys) ... later, Johnnie enlisted in the local Territorial Battalion, which corresponds to our National Guard, and was assigned to the signal section ... he was mobilized in 1914 but was too young to go overseas ... the following year he was with the British troops at Gallipoli and celebrated his 18th birthday in a "bombing sap" in the Vineyard Gallipoli, as you probably do not remember, was officially evacuated by the British and French on January 8, 1916., .. Johnnie was in the last bunch to gohe left there at 2.45 A.M. January 9th, to be exact...still sorving in the signal section he campaigned in Egypt and after the fall of Jerusalem. went to France where he served until the Armistice ... but enough of war and now for radio ... Johnnie's first set, naturally chough, was a cat's whisker crystal receiver ... later he graduated to a Philoo, then an RCA and now he has a Super Skyrider and is he riding high!... became interested in DXing through reading letters in the Newark News...largely through the efforts of Lou Hafn's CPC, he has brought his log up to 720 heard and 499 verified ... Sanderson is also a rabid short wave fan and has hoard 187 and VERI-FIED 142 SW stations...has 193 ham cards from 82 countries (no communication stations are included in the above)....considers 10BQ and IR5 his best BCB catches..... his most unusual catch was the Eiffel Tower in Paris Johnnie and a buddy were on duty one night in France tapping wires ... suddenly they picked up a message which puzzled them and they both decided to include it in their reports ... Johnnie was later notified that it came from the Eiffel Tower- he had picked up the station's ground wave....PKIMX is his best SW catch....Johnnie says that all Scotch jokes are manufactured in Aberdeen....he's different from most Scotchmen in that he is always handing out tips ---- tips on new short wave stations ... but all joking to the contrary, Johnnie's a ret-hot NNRCer and we wish we had a thousand more like him!

JOHN SANDERSON, assistant executive secretary of The Newark News Radio Club...born in Glasgow way back in --guess we'll have to let it go at that as Scotty as he is known to so many of his fellow members is rather sensitive about that matter...in the first World War. Johnnie fought with valor under General Allenby in Palestine. Egypt and in Gallipoli...later on he fought with the British Army in France...he was wounded in the battle of the Tomb of Samuel the Prophet in the battle of the Judean Hills ... Scotty came to the United States in 1927 ... he is currently employed by the Wing Mfg. Co., Newark, which is handling large contracts for the U.S. Navy...he became interested in the NNRC through the Club's column in The Newark Evening News and becare one of us back in 1933 ... Johnnic DXes with a Hallicrafters SX-17 and with it has compiled a really worthwhile log of stations both on the broadcast band and short waves ... he is, however. partial to the higher frequencies ... at the moment the Hallicrafters is in need of some slight repairs with the result Johnnie's DX style is cramped...he hopes to have the trusty receiver back in working order in the near future at which time a DX reports will have been long overdue ... aside from the help he has received in his DX work from his Club membership. Johnnie values it most for the large number of friends he has throughout the organization...his interest in the NNRC and particularly with regard to its continued success have been contributing factors that have led to his annual re-election, without opposition, by his fellow-members.

JACK SCHNEIDER ... who heard a radio for the first time when he listened to a public radio broadcasting the Dempsey-Firpo fight back in 1923. ... born in Uman, Province of Kiev, Ukraine, some twenty-five years ago ... came to this country after the Russian Civil Revolution ... graduated from Roselle Park (New Jersey) High School in 1930; has lived in Carwood N.J. for the past decade ... bought his first radio in 1925, the then popular five-tube Freshman Masterpicco ... with it he logged 425 stations in four years ... traded it in for an AC set but since that one could not got much DX, he acquired an Acratone, six-tube super that cost 321.50 and which he is still using today ... has now heard 943 stations and that is very nice going for a \$21.50 investmont ... Jack first hoard of the NNRC through the columns of The Newark Evening News in 1929...he joined right then and has never regretted it... Jack says: "It has been an honor and a pleasure to work with such a swell group that comprises the club momborship ... best DX catch is 10AT, Trail, Brit. Col. a ten-watter... best verified catches are loak; VESEK and WARV.... since 1928. Jack has been a helper at his local railroad froight station, a radio wiroman, shoe salosman, radio repairman, shipping clerk, radio coil manufacturing foreman and now salesman of electrical appliances.... Jack is also chairman of our important membership committee and at every meeting of the Board of Directors they're all ready to shout "Here Comes the Revolution" unless Jack has a satisfactory roport.

BILL SCHWEITZER, Novark.... employed by the Prudential Insurance Co., Novark.... bogan to fool around with radio back in 1924 with a one-tubo set ... is now five times as good a DXor as ho was then as he uses a five-tube General Electric (Editor's note-We question that statement) ... originally used a set known as the Sunday Call "Four" .. Bill has forgotten in what year he joined the NNRC but it was at the time a gent named Irving R. Potts was running for the office of president for the first time, so it was a good many yoars ago ... Bill doesn't DX oxtensively (you said it, Harry), but manages to get about forty new ones every season with plenty of 100 watters but none on the West Coast (Misery leves company, Doc Kraemer; you two hams ought to get togother) ... Bill's best catches are lOAK and IRl ... verifications total about 300 his greatest DX thrill was in 1935 when with two mugs by the name of Kraemer and Varrelman, he drove down to Allenwood, N.J. seventeen miles from nowhere, to the temporary abodo of one Roy N. Licari, a FORMER Brooklyn Dxor Upon arrival, it was found that Licari's acrial had been blown down; however, inside of two hours, Roy and Bill erected a new antenna (Kraemer and Varrelman looked on, as is customary) and inside of the same two hours Kraemer won 68 cents from Varrelman in a pinocle game (DXors? Phocey) ... Though the four went down to Allenwood primarily to hear Australia, that purpose was soon "Gone With the Wind"... the static was gargantuan (Wow!) and they could barely get the West Coast, not 100 Watters mind you but these like KFI.... was Roy's face redi...and were Bill's hands redi...the former caused by embarrassment and the latter by hard work ... Bill says he has made some splendid acquaintances through the NNRC but just whom he means we cannot imagine as every time we see him he is with those Baltimore laggards ... seriously though, there is no more conscientious worker in the organization than Bill....he has had a multitude of assignments and has handled each one efficiently- former financial secretary, member of the Board of Diroctors, bulletin committee, vice-chairman of the membership committee on which he is currently doing an A-1 job; secretary of the convention committee and just recently, was appointed assistant executive secretary, succeeding Al (Stogie) Keempel who resigned ... it has gotten so at headquarters now, we don't say "Let Goorge do it" --- we say "Let Bill do it" knowing the job will be done and done right.

FRANK SCOTT, Newark. Now Jorsey ... first saw the light of day in Fair Haven, N.J. many years ago moved to New York City at an early age a graduate of the City College of New York, class of 1892, and holds a B.S. degree ... went to work for the General Electric Co. in the Summer of that year and was married that Winter soon afterwards, Frank left G.E. and went with the Crocker-Wheeler Electrical Mfg. Co. of Ampore (East Orange), N.J. and has been with that firm EVER SINCE (isn't that consistoncy?) became interested in radio when WJZ first opened up in Newark and like everybody else in those days, he began building crystal sets (he still has one at home) ... such distant catches as WIP and WOO, Philadelphia, and WGY, Schonectady, wore heard ... came the vaccuum tube and set building began in carnest again ... Frank made himself a one-tube WD-11 "blooper" which was a dandy for DX in these days of fow broadcast channels, and his greatest thrill was logging KHJ on this one-tube baby ... when the screen grid tube first burst into being. Frank was fortunate in getting a couple of the first English types and built a receiver with one of them as an RF stage ahoad of a three CHT regenerative tunor and according to Frank, this was the bost set he ever ewned....started writing for veries about 1924, but as the stations to which he wrote were so slow in answering, he gave up the idea and now regrets it as you can well appreciate.... in those balmly days. Frank used to throw away his log each Spring and start a new one the following September! I..., he now regrets that idea too....back in 1927 when a call went out from The Newark News for a meeting of DXers. Frank Scott was right on deck and is one of the charter members of the NNRC....was chairman of the Club's DX qualifications committee for many years ... likewise, he was one of our vice-presidents for several years until poor health forced him to give up active participation in NNRC affairs....ten years ago when he joined the outfit, Frank began verifying again and now has more than 1,000 veries.... his collection of EKKO and AFCO stamps is a marvelous one and one of his greatest treasures....total of stations heard, 1150 ... Frank's kindly and genial personality have made him a prime favorite with his fellow members and it is no secret that both Frank and Mrs. Scott, who, incidentally, has been with us for several years, are two of the most party of the party popular of all NNRCers.

WALTER JACKSON SEELY of KEW GARDENS, Long Island ... despite the imposing "Walter Jackson, he is known in the Brocklyn-Long Island Chapter as "Jack"...plays an intelligent game of poker and invariably leaves a chapter meeting with plenty of "Jack"... is 25 years old and will have been married one year next Monday; has three children.. employed by The Pharma Co. a large New York chemical concorn as production man...... will probably be transferred to the company's Bayonne N.J. plant next Spring-New Jersey's gain and Brooklyn's loss...has been DXing for 15 years but has no idea how many stations he has heard....has 484 veries and counts only those verified....is a rabid RCA booster and has always used that make set...biggest thrill was logging XEJ, the Mexican 100 watter...has heard Rennes and Bordeaux but since they are not verified, he does not count them ... has never logged a TP ... Roy Licari of Allenwood, N.J. and Brooklyn. N.Y. insists that when Jack moves it should be to Allenwood so he can get some of those TPs....incidentally, when visiting Jack to get material for this sketch the writer got lost; one side of Quentin Road, on which Jack lives, is in Forest Hills, the other side is Kow Gardons ... after three hours we located him ... he took pains to show us that he has WAAB vorified ... belongs to the NNRC and no other radio club... "The bost is good enough for me" says Jack.

WHO'S WHO -- By Harry Varrelman

RAY SHAFFAR. Waterloo, Iowa...born 46 years ago in rural southwestern Iowa, and at 13 was riding and breaking many a tough bronc ... Also took many a brutal spill ... A few years later decided to become a lawyer, and acted as law clerk, trying a few minor cases, all of which he won. Office routine got too irksome after 3 years, and Ray gave up the legal profession Came the World War, and Ray joined up. He was a reporter on a military newspaper published in camp. After his discharge, photography attracted his attention, and with the air of a battery of high speed cameras, made quite a bit of mpney. With the mass production of Kodaks, this line fell off a great deal.... Shaffar has also had a great many experiments with raising bees, and at one time developed a colony capable of storing up a surplus equal to 4 times that of ordinary bees After an unprofitable investment in some Wisconsin land. Ray got a job in a logging camp. His record for the first day was astounding, and the foreman told him to slow down --Ray did just the opposite, and the strain made him muscle-bound for several weeks. In the winters, when logging was slow, Ray used to act as guide for deer and bear hunters. One time he was chasing some game and ended up by hunting on an Indian reservation, umbeknownst to him. Five Indian braves nabbed him and started to take him to the Indian justice, but Ray started gabbing, passed out the smokes, produced some snake-bite remedy, and pretty soon the Injuns and the Great White Father were palsy-walsy. After this the Injuns told him to go ahead and hunt on their land all he pleased! Whatta diplomet! In 1928, Ray became interested in welding, and bought a shop in Iowa . . . but came the depression and gone with the wind went the shop Is now working with John Deere Tractor Co., and has charge of maintenance on 50,000 machines. Likes the firm very much, and feels that he is with a good outfit. Ray became interested in radio in 1935, when he moved to Waterloo. Bought a 5-tube Philco which he wore out in 6 months. The DX bug took a good bite, and Ray pulled in a lot of stations -- however did not verify until KEPN was heard asking for reports. They sent him a nice verie, and a new verification hound was born. Bought himself a McMurdo-Silver Masterpiece V, which he thinks is the world's best receiver. Worked on the short waves for three years, and then came back to the broadcast band. Now has about 500 veries, and sends an average of 65 reports to stations each month. Sends in very elaborate reports, and several broadcasters have commented that his letters are the most useful ones they have ever received ... With the most attractive radio shack in town. Ray has had visitors from many sections of the U.S.A. One day in 1938, a senor from Buenos Aires arrived with the American consul and asked to be shown the receiver Ray used, etc. A SW station in Buenos Aires had mentioned Ray's excellent report, and so the caballero paid him a visit, and since he had just returned from a 3-month's tour of Europe, asked Ray to try and get IRX. Was homesick and wanted to hear his favorite station. Program came through fine One of Ray's correspondents is an Oxford scholar now located in a jungle in South America, 500 miles from a postoffice, and 125 miles from his nearest neighbor. Gets mail twice a year by Indian runner. Ray became interested in the MRC when he began DXing in earnest, and heard so many programs dedicated to the club. Thinks the NNRC is the best club of its kind in the world, and considers that it covers a wider field than any other such club.

D.H. SHOTLIFF, Cheyenie, Wyoming....born in Neosho, Missouri and just recently celebrated his 46th.birthday....married to a red-headed girl and is the father of three red-headed girls (shades of Eddie Cantor !!) says he also has a dog-house in which he spends considerable time....is baggage agent for the Union Pacific R. at Cheyenne...his job is a nightmare at this time of the year, weat with the heavy Xmas mail traffic.... generally takes 16 hours a day to keep on top of it....D.H. has spent practically all his life on a railroad having started in as a telegrapher when he was sixteen...has also worked as station agent, train dispatcher, towerman and almost everything clse connected with the movement of trains.... Shotty says that Wyoming isn't such a bad state with its beautiful Summers and fairly decent Winter woather until January ... in January and Fobruary, HOWEVER, the thermometer semetimes hits 40 below zero!....this sounds cold and no doubt it is, but if the wind isn't blowing the cold doesn't seem to penetrate the way it does in a lower or wetter climate ... although Obeyenne has a population of above 20,000, plus about 4,000 soldiers quartered at Fort Warren, which is nearby, it has no local radio station this is unusual since it is the state capitol ... Shotty says the local newspapers are closely connected with the senators and representatives and they have managed to keep a station out Cheyenne is famous for its frontier days, the outstanding rodeo of the world, held the last week of July in case you might want to take it in next Summer Shotty DXes with a Scott all-wave set and one of these days he's going to sneak a Skyrider in the back door ... DX is none too perfect in Wyoming ... the dry winds seem to create lots of static and additionally, there are plenty of thunderstorms during the Summer. ... the local power company also provides its quota of static....the log stands at 575 heard as Shotty doesn't verify many of his catches....in 1923 he dragged in WLIB on an old battery set which he then thought was a good catch and still thinks so never belonged to any radio club until he joined the MNRC thinks it is a fine club and derives more enjoyment from it than any other connection...he especially likes the bulletin, believing it keeps the membership closely knit ... D.H. is our state director for Wyoming and a 100 per cent MNRCer.

MRS. GRACE L. and FRANK E. SIMPSON, Montclair, N.J....the club's outstanding mother and son DX team...and a grand team it is could probably lick the entire Board of Directors with one dial tied behind its back....they have heard 1,400 stations of which 910 are verified ... have logged 34 Mexicans, 50 Cubans and 70 Canadians!....Frank first began to DX back in 1929 when his father bought him a nine-tube Silvertone ... it was quite an improvement over the one-tube, home-made set he had previously been using....Frank soon logged KNX, Hollywood, and that was his biggest DX thrill...getting the "Coast" when that phrase really meant something....in 1930 Mrs. Simpson became ill and the result was that she became very nervous and upset; she couldn't sleep well, so she would turn on the radio and listen to distant stations...after about an hour of this, she would become composed and her insomnia would vanish- and her log would increase ... DXing, with Mrs. Simpson, began as something the doctor ordered and now that sho is feeling fit again, sticks to it because as she says "It is so much fun and I would rather DX than go to the best movie" Mrs. Simpson and Frank correspond with many stations and Bobby Briggs of KRGV, Toxas, once dedicated a fifteen-minute program to Frank ... they have been exceptionally active members of the club and their record of attendance at meetings and other NNRC functions is extraordinarily high... Mrs. Simpson adds: "Wo just snatch the bulletin from the mail box and enjoy the contents thereof, as soon as it arrives ... it makes us very happy to know that the bulletin is so highly valued and we hope the Simpsons will be with us many more years and that they will continue to enjoy reading about their activities and those of their follow-DXors.

JOSEPH F. SMITH, East Orange, New Jersey ... "Alderman Joe" ... native Jersey ite and has lived in the Garden State for nearly half a century ... recently celebrated his 25th wedding anniversary.... is the father of twin daughters.... employed by the General Electric Company as a cost accountant. . . (incidentally, Joe isn't very patriotic as he uses a Philco radio) ... has been a member of the club for eight years but. in all that time, Louis Hahn has failed to persuade Joe that he ought to meet and know Ophelia (perhaps it is just as well for Joe that he doesn't evince the slightest interest in that fair damosel) ... has been interested in radio since the days of the home-made "cat's whisker" sets ... has veries from every State in the Union ... holds Ace certificate No. 64 ... as chairman of the DX Qualifications Committee, Joo has been very active and has done much to stimulate interest in DX certificates ... he is currently head of the Lansdale 1937 NNRC Convention Committee. . has, for several years, been a member of the club's Board of Directors whereon he has shown independence in thought and action, and, while his methods of accomplishing an end have often been open to question and serious discussion, nevertheless, he has a record of battling for those policies which he believes are for the best interests of the club..... Joe says that it is his ambition "To live in a house by the side of the road and be a friend to all MNRCers and in fact, to all mankind!

JACK V. SODEN, Raleigh, Nawth Callina ... the club's most prolific and verbose pedagogue...first saw the light of day in Newark and has been a night owl ever since...at high school, he was a "four-letter man"- baseball, track, riding and basketball ... studied art and foreign languages under a private tutor until "Monotony on the Bounty" got him and he went to work ... is now a Tour-syllable" man (ask Barney Ahman) ... Jack's hobby is compiling logs for advertising purposes and calibrating new sets for dealers. ... although he didn't say so, his other hobbies might be-1. Awarding the Iron Cross to the Rooster for a superiority complex; 2- Awarding Big Bon to the Rip Van Winkle of East Hartford, Conn.; 3- Awarding spurs to "Slim" Ahman for eloquence and orthography, etc ... all joking aside, Jack seems to lead a very full and amusing life- his witty spirit and originality are a decided tenic to all who have been exposed to it and his steel-shafted pen has punctured good-naturedly, several egetists... to this bon vivant, his highness of Lol-de-la and king of elan, wo offer this coronation "Who's Who" and if he ever comes to Brooklyn (Editor's note-Why in goodness' name would Jack ever think of going to Brooklyn unless it might be to onter a home for the aged) we'll personally crown him. (Aside to Jack: "If you know when you're woll off, you'll stay in Raleigh).

GEORGE H. STAMMLER.... of the University of Nawth Carolina, suh.... at Chapel Hill, Nawth Carolina....a freshman....throw the man out -- he's a nogood Yankee....Who's a nogood Yankee -- I'm a good Pennsylvania Dutchman...Born at Johnstown, Pennsylvania, in November, 1921, and at the age of five moved to Bethlehem (Pa., not Asia). He had heard that the steel companies were looking for men, and he moved there to get a job. After he growed up, and was an aged man of 12 or 13, he moved to a good state, and now resides in Summitt, New Joisey ... A few months of New Joisey's fair climate braces him up, and he is then able to pursue his studies in that nogood Jack Soden's state ... George says he doesn't know yet what he is going to study (you see what N.C. does to you) but thinks mebbe he's like advertising, publicity work, or announcing. Since he's has always been a "radio bug" he will probably, he opines, end up in that field. As Les Kraemer says, "If he's such a good radio bug, he'll end up in the bughouse.".... George says Chapel Hill is a pleasant little town of 2000 people, and despite its size, there's always something doing. Began going after DX in 1953 with a 5-tube Majestic. A year later he bought a 7-tube Fada, and last spring bought an 8-tube Hallicrafter. Does his Chapel Hill DX with the Fada, though naturally this is not as good as the Hallicrafter. Since December, 1939, George has logged 146 stations, and has veries from 72. This is a nice record for two months. Best catches include KFWB. Los Angeles; CBK, Saskatchewan; CJRM, Regina; and KOY, Phoenix, Ariz....W2LAU (Warren Rebell, of Summit, N.J.) has kept up George's interest in radio, and after reading about those Cincinnati rascals (George Jacobs) in the recent Radex, decided to join the MRC. George reports that the Mutual Network -- and a very nice network it is -will carry a program from the University of North Carolina on March 2.... Maybe we will find out then what the Governor of South Carolina said to the Governor of Nawth Car.

ALFRED J. KFSG and CKWX (Are you listoning, Krapmer?) ... extra added attractions were RUS and VOAS ... about this time, Roy began to read about other DXers in Charlotte Goer's column in The News, so in February, 1928, he mailed in an application for momborship in The Newark News DX Club, its correct name in those days, and became one of its first out-of-town members....has never joined any other club as he has enjoyed his NNRC membership and says it fills his DX needs..., bought his first electric set in 1934- a Phileo 16B, with which he has added more than 100 stations including 1YA, CP4, IR1-2-4-5, CX26, HJN, Poste Parisien and Radio Normandio.... biggest thrill was the night of the Dempsey-Firpo fight ... he and a friend were splitting a pair of headphones... the set was full of "body capacity" and you had to keep both hands flat on the dials and both feet on the floor or you lost the station ... during the bout when Firpo knocked Dompsey out of the ring. Roy gaye his pal a hearty slap on the back ... of course, you can't slap a guy on the back and keep two hands on the dial at the same time ... well, with the slap, away went the station ... by the time it was tuned in again they were hearing the decision having missed the kneckout by Dempsoy ... Utter confusion reigned ... a real DX thrill for Roy was hearing KFI for the first time; also KOH whon he completed his record of having heard all states ... Poste Parision, his first oversoas catch, componsated for some lost sloop..., hobbics other than DX are tennis, travel, football, ice fishing and raising chickens, you know, the feathered variety ... Roy offers the suggestion that our bulletin list once a month "This Month's Changes" as we formerly did in the Dialist ... the NNRC is fortunate that Roy selected it for his DX diversion ... we're happy indeed that he joined and has continued with us down through the years.

Later he returned to a suburb of Baltimore and with a Montgomery-Ward special set had fine results ... with it he brought in 12 South American BCB stations in one night with R9 loudspeaker volume!! ... is currently DXing with a 16-tube Hallicrafters SX-26 which is powerful, selective and sensitive, all at the same time... Hank recommends this set highly ... as accessories he has two grounds connected together and an efficient antenna set-up ... Hank believes the dual grounds are essential if the maximum of performance is to be secured from this receiver ... Hank does not keep a log and restricts his dialing to the tough stuff- foreign DX ... among his catches this year are TIPG, Costa Rica, 625 kcs...OAX4A, Lima, Peru, on 854...HJCZ, Bogota, Colombia, on 1040 and HJCR, also in Bogota but on 1200 kcs... WIAC, San Juan, Puerto Rico, recently verified ... Among his other verifications are LR1, LS2, CX26, CP4, LR5, LR8, YV1RC, Radio Normandie, Poste Parisien, Radio Heilsberg, Trieste, Turan, Milan, VK42g, VK4RK, WKAQ, VK3AR, WPRA, WNEL, HIX, HHK, TGw, ZNS, VE9EK, 10BQ, 10BP and 10AB...Hank joined the NNRC through his friendship with the Pride of Sparrows Point- Lou McVey- with an assist thrown in by our Baltimore Blushing Violet, Rooster Hahn ... Friend Wilksnson appears to be an excellent Dier and we certainly are happy to have him as a member. .. We join . with him in looking forward to the day when, in peacetime, we shall be able to meet him and all other NNRCers at a Club convention.
