

Part IV – International Broadcasts

By the mid-1930s, the IDA had shifted its focus from foreign broadcast band DX to shortwave, but it continued to cover all bands. This is reflected in this mix of station photos--shortwave, mediumwave, longwave, plus a few utilities and hams (the IDA membership included many hams).

Notes: The Radio El Mundo (Argentina) shortwave channels LRX and LRU carried the programming of mediumwave LR1 (pg. 1).... PLE was in Bandung, Indonesia (pg. 7).... 2RO was in Rome (pg. 7).... The EIAR station in Tripoli was operated by the Italian government, which controlled Libya at the time (1939) (pg. 7).... JQAK mediumwave and JDY shortwave transmitted from Dairen, Manchuria (pg. 8).... XEWI was in Mexico City (pg. 8).... YN3DG was run by Dennis E. Gallo, a ham who also operated as a broadcaster, YNDG, "Station Gilfillan" (pg. 8).

















