EDITORIAL

THE International Short Wave League is launched! For some time, letters have been received expressing the wish that Short Wave News should sponsor a society for the short wave enthusiast. We have carefully weighed up the idea, considering the need for such a society, the snags that are liable to be met, and the facilities that would be required by the members. The conclusions reached are, first, that there is room for a progressive society, and that now, with the approach of the DX season, is the most favourable time to venture on such a project.

The objects of the I.S.W.L. are simple, but embracing, as will be seen from the leaflet enclosed in this issue. The I.S.W.L. will cater for every class of short wave enthusiast, be he constructor, listener or transmitter. Entry into the I.S.W.L. is not hampered by any unnecessary restrictions, and there will be no varying classes of membership.

For the present, membership fees are purely nominal and are intended simply to cover cost of certificates, postage, address plates and so forth. Membership identification numbers will consist of the letters "I.S.W.L." followed by the prefix for locality coupled to an individual number, e.g., ISWL/VK234 would indicate a member in Australia.

Until such time as the membership justifies the publication of a separate League journal, which would of course entail an increase in subscription, it is proposed to publish news of League activities in the pages of Short Wave News.

The facilities to be offered to members, such as stationery, competitions, query services, formation of local "chapters," QSL Bureau, and so forth, are now under consideration, and will be put into effect at the earliest possible moment.

We should be pleased to receive offers from readers who would be prepared to act in an official capacity as Representatives, Departmental Managers, and the like, with some details as to their experience in such matters.

We should appreciate it, too, if those reading this Editorial, would pass on the good news to such of their friends as are, unfortunately, unable to obtain a copy of this issue. The League depends, obviously, upon the support and co-operation given by its members. It is, therefore, up to YOU!

The First Annual devoted entirely to the Short Wave Listener will be published by us next month. Containing a wealth of useful, and vital, information for the DX listener, the first edition will consist of 80 pages, printed on heavy paper, and bound in a durable cover. The only book of its type and accuracy available in this country, it will be modestly priced at 2/6, and will be obtainable from local booksellers, or in cases of difficulty, at 2/9, post free, from ourselves. The highest possible degree of accuracy is maintained throughout the book, which includes some dozen tables, and this has only been made possible by the careful checking of all the information at our disposal. We advise readers to book their copy as early as possible in order to avoid any possible disappointment.



MONTHLY NEWS

E are off to a flying start! Though the founding of the I.S.W.L. was only announced in our last issue, the membership is already encouraging, and is steadily increasing. It is obvious that such a society was needed! It is evident, too, that readers are not joining simply to get a new number to add after their names! No, our members are most definitely an active crowd, and if the interest keeps up, then we will have a League that really has some life in it!

Since the I.S.W.L. is sponsored by "Short Wave News" the question will arise "who is going to run the League?" Well, it is our contention that a League should be run by its members, though in actual fact few of them really are. The usual procedure is for the members to elect a Council, who decide on matters of policy for a given period, after which a new election is held. Sounds all right in theory, but our experience-and we have some practical knowledge of this !- is that those nominated for election are rarely known to the majority of members. Sometimes, when in office, the Council will sound the members on a question of policy, but all too often the decisions made represent merely the views of the Council, plus personal friends, and not those of the majority of members.

We have an alternative system, and we are going to try it out right away! We propose that all major questions be put direct to the members themselves, who will write in and give their views, the decisions made to comply with the majority vote. The objection that some members will not be bothered to write in, will arise. Agreed,

but at least they WILL have had the opportunity, and cannot complain should they be displeased with the final decision. Anyway, let us know how you feel about it.

As far as the "pen and ink" side is concerned, we have a cosy office at HQ, and will be pleased to accept offers from London members who care to come along and lend a helping hand. We should like to point out, for the benefit of those who have "had some," that there will be no question of being asked to perform such tasks as addressing hundreds of envelopes! We've been caught on that one ourselves, and have invested in an Addressograph machine to take care of that problem!

Next month we will publish our first list of I.S.W.L. county representatives, and further details of the League progress. If you have not yet joined the I.S.W.L.—send along that shilling right now!

In our next I.S.W.L. notes we will give details of the first members' services to be put into operation. Now here are a few points—prompted by our mailbag!

MONTHLY NOTES

First Steps to Better Reporting

Having aired our views on poor S.W.L. reporting in our Editorial of May, we now intend to carry forward our aims into the practical sphere. First, however, a few words of preamble.

The importance of good reporting cannot be stressed too highly. A poor report from an I.S.W.L. member not only reduces his chances of getting a QSL but it also has the effect of gaining a black mark for S.W.L's generally and black mark for the I.S.W.L. in particular. Since we count ourselves as the foremost in the movement for better reporting we cannot run the risk of loss of prestige due to a thoughtless member lowering our prescribed standards.

One of our prominent CR's has put forward a suggestion that we have rather fallen in with and feel that members should be given an opportunity to approve or reject it. Briefly the plan would work like this: Stations to be notified from HQ by circular that the I.S.W.L. is pressing for a higher standard of reporting. Stations would be asked to return to I.S.W.L. HQ all reports that are so devoid of information as to be useless to the recipient, instead of depositing them in the w.p.b. HQ then to notify individual members that reports sent out by them have been rejected as of no interest to stations. It is suggested that if further poor reports are received, following TWO warnings, then the offending members to be asked to resign from the League as unworthy of membership.

Well, that's the plan. Is it too drastic? That is for you, the members, to decide. We are saying nothing at present. Now it's up to you all to write in with your views on the subject. Let us have your views, suggestions and constructive criticisms, please!

Next month, we will give some "Reporting Pointers" for those new to the hobby.

We launch another new service for members! Introducing the INSTRUCTION MANUAL AND CIRCUIT SERVICE.

THE above service is now available for ISWL members and is working in close co-operation with our Surplus Gear Query Service. The object of the service, as its name implies, is to provide members with instruction manual and/or circuits, on loan, of radio receivers, transmitters, etc., both of ex-WD origin and civilian manufacture. The working of this service depends to some extent on the co-operation of ISWL members themselves, since information is required by the service on many types. Here are the details as finally decided upon:

SWL CARD SWAPPING

Though some harsh things have been said, and will no doubt continue to be said, against the practice of exchanging SWL cards, it is apparent that many members are interested in this side-line. One of the troubles is that the whole thing can become annoying if it is done haphazardly. For instance, we have had complaints in the past that members have been receiving SWL cards from other members repeatedly and asking for one of theirs. The point is that many are NOT interested, or may not have SWL cards-preferring to send stations a more complete report-and it is rather unfair to expect the recipients to swap if they see no point in it.

The solution was suggested by Hampshire CR Reg Masters, who offers to run a Bureau for those keen on SWL card exchanges. This method would ensure that people not interested would not be pestered by those who want to exchange cards. It would restrict activities within the circle of swappers. So there you are, OM's. THE I.S.W.L. DEDICATORY PROGRAMME FROM W.R.U.L.

Excellent Reception of a most Interesting Broadcast

I.S.W.L. REPORT AN ACCOUNT OF THE STATE OF THE LEAGUE

EVERY member of the League is, or should be, interested in the present position of the ISWL. With this thought in mind, we at HQ have decided to place before members a full account of progress since January this year. It is proposed that this report shall appear regularly thereby placing on record, for every members reference, the forward march of the ISWL. Secretaries of League Groups are asked to place this report before Group supporters for their information and discussion—any resolutions arising from this report should be forwarded to ISWL HQ as soon as possible.

MEMBERSHIP

The total membership continues to show an upward trend and in the six months from January 1st, to June 30th a total of six hundred and sixty new members were enrolled. This averages out at exactly one hundred and ten per month which is extremely gratifying. Renewals continue to roll in at a very high rate, although it is fair to record that some did not renew. Renewal notices are forwarded to members at the termination of a one year period, while a circular was forwarded to all members who had been in the League within the past eighteen months, but who had failed to renew.

The sum result of this activity has shown that interest in the organisation is increasing apace, and the total active strength at June 30th stood at some two thousand eight hundred and sixty eight members.

ACTIVITIES

ISWL activities at the present time show conclusively that we are among the most active SWL organisation in the world today. This is borne out by the following. Broadcasts. Two of these ISWL Dedicatory Programmes have recently taken place, both of which were popular and well reported upon. Contests. A review of the ISWL Notes since January gives the full story for all to see. During the first half of this year, all the contests have been for Group Teams, both the Amateur and Broadcast events being well supported. The main annual Amateur contestants.

During the remainder of the year, contests will be organised for individual entrants as opposed to Group teams. This should prove popular and will give everybody a chance to show just what he can do. Not everyone in the League is able to attend Group meetings, and it is for these as well as the regular Group supporters that these contests are arranged. They will be for both the Amateur and Broadcast Bands. Committee. An ISWL Committee is in the process of formation and full details will be published as soon as a properly constituted meeting has taken place. The duty of this body will be to represent all the various aspects of the League and to lay down the general policy of the organisation. Only in this way can we make the ISWL democratic. Services. The various services as listed in HQ/C/0005

are fully active, many of them under new managers. Several that were listed some months ago are now ORT and have been erased from the service register. Altogether, we now have eighteen services which are free to all fully-paid up members. These are listed fully in the above mentioned seven-page leaflet, which is also offered free to members on receipt of a stamped addressed envelope similiar in size to that issued with the News. Group Meetings. Group reports containing the latest available information of activities. meeting places and times etc., are regularly published, space permitting, within the ISWL Notes. A perusal of these over the past few months will give all the information that is required by those about to contact the Hon. Sec's for the first time. Activities here include morse classes, RAE exam classes. lectures, demonstrations, visits to local places of radio interest, field days, junk sales, ragchews and the like. HQ/C/0014. This is the latest leaflet available and it sets out the ISWL Rules in tabulated form together with the conditions of membership. This leaflet is also free to any member who complies with the conditions as set out above for HO/C/0005. Others available are HQ/C/0001 for CRs and HQ/C/0002 for TRs.

SUPPLIES

A full range of member's supplies are available at reasonable prices; these include badges, headed notepaper (no advertising), continuation sheets, envelopes, report pads, index file cards, and the Countries Heard Diploma.

AWARDS

Annually are awarded the silver cups to the winning Group, both in the Amateur and the Broadcast Contests. While the trophy itself is retained at HQ, a small replica is engraved and despatched to the Group concerned, and becomes the permanent property of that Group The former may be inspected at HQ by any interested member at any time. In addition to these awards, the ISWL Certificate of Merit is awarded to winners and runners up in the various individual contests. An illustration appeared in the last issue.

REPRESENTATIVES

A DR, CR or TR, once appointed, becomes an honorary member of the League. No dues are paid by him as it is felt that his services and expenditure deserve full support from HQ. We now have one hundred and seventy officials who are entitled under Rule 6 to such membership. This figure does not include service managers and Group secretaries. Our reps. are scattered throughout the world, and include among them some of the top line DX'ers and authorities. Without these hard working officials, no League can run efficiently for long, if at all.

GROUPS

At home here in the British Isles we have to date 53 active purely ISWL Groups with four affiliations, making a total of 57 in all. Added to this, we have some 16 Groups now notified as in the process of formation. Overseas we show six active Groups. Other organisations. We are, at the moment, working in very close collaboration with other short wave societies and to date we have effected an affiliation with the OTC Goodwill Club, Canadian Dx League and the URDXC of the U.S.A.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I would state that the League is in a very healthy state indeed and we have nothing to fear from the future. We can justly claim that we are a most active and go ahead SWL organisation and our record is here for all to see. Plans are in hand for many more activities, but these we will tell you more about in the future.

INTERNATIONAL SHORT WAVE LEAGUE FIRST INDIVIDUAL AMATEUR BAND DX CONTEST

Conditions

- 1 The Contest shall be open to any ISWL member.
- 2 The duration of the Contest shall be from 1500 hrs GMT, October 7th, to 2359 hrs GMT October 8th.
- 3 The Contest shall be for the reception of amateur telephony and CW stations.
- 4 Reception will be confined to the 14 Mcs Amateur band only.
- 5 No "CO" call shall be allowable for scoring purposes.
- 6 Zones and Countries shall be determined according to the tables published in the "Op Aid."
- 7 Scoring shall be as follows:—Each Zone heard will score one point and each Country heard will score one point (50 Countries and 20 zones will result in 50 by 20, or 1,000 points.)
- 8 Each individual log shall contain the following data:—Date, Time (GMT), Station claimed, Station being worked, F/CW, QSA/R-RST, Zone. At the conclusion of each log, the Zone and Countries total claimed shall be given (e.g., 50 Countries by 20 zones = 1,000 points.)
- 9 Each separate log sheet shall also contain the following information—Type of receiver(s), aerial(s), and other associated equipments used, the operators ISWL number and signature.
- 0 Members shall submit their logs to HQ, to reach the office not later than first post October 30th.
- The judges of the contest shall be the League President G2UK, G2ATV and G193. The decisions of the judging committee shall be regarded as final.



ISWL SERVICES

In response to many requests from members, we publish this month, a full list of all our services. When using these services, members are requested to include an SAE for reply.

QSL BUREAU

This Bureau caters for both amateur and broadcast operators. It offers facilities for two-way QSL distribution and is the only one in the world to cater for the broadcast listener.

Incoming

Any member of the ISWL may avail himself of the Bureau for the purpose of receiving incoming cards, free of charge, by the simple process of submitting a supply of SAE's of suitable size to accommodate the average QSL card. Each member will be notified when a further supply of envelopes is required. This, by the way, applies to both amateur and broadcast sections.

The following general rules should be carefully observed:—

- (a) The use of the Bureau is confined exclusively
- to ISWL members.
 (b) The use of the Bureau is free of charge.
- (c) In order to obtain incoming cards, it is necessary to submit only a supply of
- SAE's—(stamped, addressed envelopes).

 (d) QSL's or reports will be accepted for onward transmission to any station ANY-
- WHERE IN THE WORLD.

 (e) Members will be notified when a further supply of SAE's are required.
- (f) SAE's submitted should be of a size suitable to accommodate the average QSL card (6" × 4") and should bear the member's ISWL number in the top left hand corner.
- (g) Where report sheets as supplied by the League are used, they should be folded to quarter size and the station call sign written on the outside. When used in

conjunction with a QSL card, they should be folded and pasted or securely fastened to the card.

(h) Correspondence to the Bureau should be confined to matters relating to it and should be addressed in the following manner:—ISWL QSL Bureau, 57 Maida Vale, London, W9.

Outgoing

Any number of QSL's and attached reports may be sent to the Bureau for onward transmission. These should be securely wrapped and plainly addressed to the Bureau as outlined above.

General Notes

All reports, both incoming and outgoing, are cleared as soon as received.

Both SWL and Tx reports are handled by the Bureau.

Those ISWL members who have never used a Bureau, having read so far, will appreciate the benefits gained by doing so. These are:—

- (1) That cards or reports can be forwarded to addresses which are unknown to the sender.
- (2) Owing to the saving in postage to the recipient, particularly amateurs, by bulk mailing of replies, the report/reply ratio is raised.
- (3) A considerable saving in postage expenses by the sender.

IBIS—ISWL BROADCAST STATION IDENTIFICATION SERVICE

This service is a unique one for the SW broadcast listener. The ISWL operates a number of Monitoring stations and by means of these and a well kept card index system, almost any broadcast station can be identified provided sufficient information is supplied.

With the ever-changing scene on these bands, the average SWL is often unable to trace or identify a particular station. This service sifts and checks news of frequency changes, new stations, unidentified transmissions, etc., and files the relavent data at the control station.

A reply is guaranteed in all cases within seven days of receiving the query.

Where the information is not on file, the net will be put into operation for checking purposes. This service exists for broadcast stations only and does not apply to press relays, etc.

Known as IBIS, it is in full operation and awaits your queries. Address letters to:—IBIS, ISWL HQ, 57 Maida Vale, London, W9.

Conditions of Use

- Stamped addressed envelopes for return of query must be enclosed.
- (2) ISWL number must be quoted.
- (3) Queries must be written on one side of the paper only.
- (4) Enquiries to be limited to a maximum of three such queries.
- 5) In every case, please state the following:—
 (a) Approximate frequency.
- (b) Time of reception GMT
- (c) Language used, (if known).
- (d) Type of programme.
- (e) QSA/R.
- (f) Rx, aerial and associated equipment used.
- (g) Whether xtal in use and IF of Rx.
- (h) Any other relevant details, i.e.—opening and closing times, interval signal, etc., if known.

COUNTRIES HEARD DIPLOMA

The conditions of issue of these Diplomas

are:—
(1) The Diploma will be available only to

fully paid members of the ISWL.

(2) The Diploma shall be available in three distinct sections, i.e., Telegraphy, Telephony and Mixed.

(3) Grading will be determined according to the number of countries verifed, on a decade scale, i.e., Grade 1-10 countries, Grade 2-20 countries, and so on.

(4) Proof of reception? for the countries claimed, in the form of QSL cards and/or letters of verification, must be submitted to the Certificates Secretary on application, together with a list of the countries claimed.

(5) Where rule (4) is deemed unsatisfactory to the applicant, he may submit a signed statement by his CR, TR (or other League Official) to the effect that the QSL's concerned have been examined and found to be genuine. This will be accepted by the Certificates Secretary who shall, however, reserve the right to request that certain QSL's claimed be submitted to him for personal inspection should this, for any given reason, be considered necessary.

(6) A nominal fee of one shilling shall be made for each Diploma, covering cost of printing, postage etc. (U.S.A. \$0.20)

(7) Members may apply for a Diploma of

higher grading when sufficient additional QSL's are obtained. When applying for a new Diploma, it shall not be necessary to list QSL's for countries already claimed.

A list of Diploma holders, under the three separate sections, will be published regularly in the "SHORT WAVE NEWS".

Minutes of the ISWL Committee meeting held at HQ on 7th July, 1951. Meeting commenced at 11.45 a.m., the General Manager being in the chair.

Item 1.

Proposed by F. Baldwin that possible appointment of a Certificates Secretary to be left in abeyance until Mr. Whitehead reports back to Committee on his own endeavours in this matter.

Resolved. That this be done. Carried unanimously.

Item 2.

Proposed that 5 Rules pertaining to "Country-Club" certificate be formulated.

Resolved. That this matter be dealt with immediately. Agreed unanimously and rules formulated.

Item 3.

Proposed by Ray Aldridge that an L.C.C. hall be hired for the middle of September for a fuil-scale meeting of London ISWL members. Admission to be by ticket priced 1/-. Members under 16 to be charged half-price.

Resolved. That this matter be put back for

further discussion, when Mr. Aldridge shall

be available.

Item 4.

Proposed by Mr. Winchester, G.2152, that certain contests be organised on a county basis, there to be a standard group of 6 operators. If numbers of operators exceeds this, then such counties to be handicapped on a sliding scale.

Resolved. That Mr. Winchester be thanked for his excellent suggestion, but the Hon. Secretary to notify him that, regretfully, the idea must be left in abeyance until such time as a Contests Committee shall be founded. Agreed unanimously.

Item 5. It was found that items forwarded for inclusion in ISWL Committee agenda by Birmingham ISWL Group were not relevant.

Item 6.

Proposed by East London Group that more information be extracted from Contest Logs for the interest of listeners, and possible advancement of knowledge on the behaviour of bands.

Resolved. To approach the East London CR and ask his co-operation in this scheme.

Item 7.

Proposed by East London Group that more space in SWN be devoted to Group activities.

Resolved. That this be done, but that East London Group realise that Group notes are notoriously slow in forthcoming, and in the case of East London Group, have had to be compiled verbally from other sources than the secretary.

No further business being to hand, the meeting terminated at 15.30 p.m.

ISWL DX AWARDS-An Announcement.

It will be noted from Item No. 2 in the Committee Agenda, that a whole range of certificated awards are being planned and produced, and the certificate referred to is now in the course of production.

There will be five of these in a comprehensive range designed to cover most interests of the active short wave listener, and the first of these, now ready for issue, is announced below. Other certificates in the series will be—Country Club, Top Band Counties, Zone, and Heard all Continents Awards. The rules for issue of these, together with other matters connected with the awards, are now under consideration by the ISWL Committee, and further announcements will take place within these Notes in the very near future.

With the introduction of these, League members will be in a position to avail themselves of six certificates, each representing an achievement in the field of Dx.

DX Awards

The full list of Dx awards available to League members is shown below, and it will be noted that these are available for both the Broadcast and the Amateur enthusiast, it being the opinion of the Committee that the Broadcast operator is as much entitled to consideration as any other enthusiast.

COUNTRY CLUB AWARD

For this, the applicant must produce verifications from sixty (60) different Countries, either in the form of QSL cards or letter veries. These must either be ALL Amateur or ALL Broadcast; mixed grades will NOT be considered to qualify. For the Amateur, such QSLs may either be phone or CW mixed, no separate certificate being issued for telephony or telegraphy.

TOP BAND COUNTIES AWARD

To qualify for this, a minimum of fifty (50) QSLs must be produced, each emanating from a different County within the British Isles, i.e., G, GC, GD, GJ, GM and GW. Verifications may either be 'phone or CW, and must bear proof of having been heard on 1.7 Mcs Band.

VERIFIED BRITISH EMPIRE AWARD

This will be granted to any League member who can produce for inspection, thirty-five (35) QSLs bearing British Empire prefixes. It will be available to both Broadcast and Amateur operators. Rules for this certficate are shown elsewhere in this issue.

ZONE AWARD

A total of thirty-five (35) QSLs, each from a different radio Zone of the World, will have to be produced for inspection in order to qualify for this Award. They may be 'phone and CW mixed, and this one is for Amateur operators only.

HEARD ALL CONTINENTS AWARD

This will be available to Broadcast operators *ONLY*, and to qualify, two (2) verifications from each of the Continents are required. For the purposes of this, Award, we are adopting modern practice in dividing the World into six (6) Continents as follows:—N. America, S. America, Europe, Asia, Australasia and Africa. A total of twelve (12) verifications will be required.

COUNTRIES HEARD DIPLOMA

With the new Certificate scheme now coming into operation, this Diploma will be awarded up to a maximum of forty (40) verifications, each from a different Country. This decision has been taken so that beginners in the art may have the opportunity of obtaining a League recognition of the often slow and laborious task involved in collecting a sufficient number of QSLs etc., for the higher gradings. This will be available in Grades 1 to 4, i.e., for Grade 1, the applicant must produce ten (10) verifications from ten countries, and so on. Previous rules in respect of this Award are cancelled.

Of the above, Nos. 2 and 4 are for Amateur operators *ONLY*, 5 for Broadcast *ONLY* and 1, 3 and 6, for both Amateur or Broadcast enthusiasts.

These certificates are produced on good quality card (not paper), and are of the same size as the ISWL membership certificate.

They are attractively styled in three colours and will prove to be a worthwhile addition to any shack wall, especially when framed.

Obtaining these Awards will not be easy, although at the same time, we have not set the standard so high that they will prove to be virtually unobtainable in practise. To adopt the latter course would not only place the issue of these outside the reach of 99.9% of SWLs, but would also reduce these Awards to little more than a talking point. We feel that we have struck a reasonable balance between that which is too easy and that which is virtually unobtainable.

NOTES

To qualify for any of these Awards, the cards or letter verifications MUST BE PRODUCED. They should be securely wrapped and forwarded to ISWL HQ, preferably by registered post. Do not, however, apply for any of the above at present, except for the Verified British Empire Award, which is available immediately upon successful application. Rules for the issue of the remaining certificates will be published as they become available and at the Committee's discretion. Each certificate will have a different colour scheme.

Of the newly introduced certificates, Nos. 2, 3 and 4 will be issued free, while for Nos. 1 and 5, a small cover charge of one shilling will be made to offset production and postage costs of the whole range. It is felt that no objections will be offered to this in view of the very heavy costs which we shall incur in the production and distribution of these first rate certificates.

RULES FOR "VERIFIED BRITISH EMPIRE AWARD"

- All applicants must be members of the ISWL.
- Qualifying conditions for this certificate shall be the production for scrutiny of recognised verifications, i.e., either QSL cards or letters, from thirty-five (35) countries within the British Empire.
- 3. Produced verifications must either be (a) ALL Amateur or, (b) ALL Broadcast. Qualification will NOT be considered unless the necessary verifications are produced. Mixed verifications, i.e., Broadcast and Amateur combined will NOT qualify. Such applications must be accompanied by a list of the verifications enclosed.
- Issue of this Award is free and post free.
