You can help by donating a little time each day to a care ful & systematic search of the shortwave channels for the following types of information: New stations, changes in frequency or schedule, Times for newscasts in English & other languages, times for peak reception for the weaker stations or those of most timely war interest; types of identifying signals used; other detailed information about schedules, location, power, address etc. Keep a pencil & pad before you and jot down anything you may come across and then shoot it immediately into the headquarters of the I.D.A. Some small seemingly insignificant fact may prove of vital importance to a defense agency that may need it. We are supposedly shortwave monitoring experts. Now is the time to put this skill and knowledge to a useful benefit for those who need it. I am depending upon you.

The International Dx'ers Alliance is not being dissolved and I hope to keep in touch with you from time to time if at all possible. The matter of discontinuance of publication for the present has been brought about- not by lack of interest or cooperation but by lack of sufficient revenue to continue. With overseas enrollments out of the question --a vast number of our members in the armed forces, and many others doing full time work which leaves no leisure for dx'ing revenue understandably has been on the decline. This is not your fault nor is it mine. I have carried on as long as possible meeting any deficits out of my own pocket. I am no longer able to do this.

A careful record is being kept of all unexpired subscriptions and when publication is resumed each member will receive all issues remaining to

his or her credit.

The Monitoring Network will continue to function and other IDA organizational activities will continue wherever and whenever possible.
With grateful thanks to all who have given untiringly and unselfishly in the interests of the IDA.

TEN YEARS OF SERVICE TO THE LISTENERS Ten years ago the IDA was born. Orprimarily to stimulate the hobby of broadcast band dx'ing, scope was soon enlarged to also include the then comparitively new sport of short-wave dxing. A little later the scope of the IDA was again expanded to embrace the field of amateur dx reception and an additional publication, AMA-TOURING, was introduced. The IDA by this time was flourishing beyond wildest dreams. Before the outbreak of World War II our organization actually included members in over 60 countries. With the war came a ban on amateur activities in all warring countries. This spelled the doom of amateur dx reception for the duration but other listening activities continued on an unabated basis .-- Came Pearl Harbor and the entry of the U.S. into the war, and IDA entered a new phase. Listening for pleasure only was out; listening in the interests of defense became our policy. Many of our members are already in the armed services. We are proud of them. Those of us at home are also trying to be useful by "listening" for information that may be of importance in the war effort. That our modest efforts are appreciated is borne out by the ever widening circle of government bureaus that are using the GLOBE CIRCLER as a primary source of shortwave information In addition our publication is used constantly by radio networks, press services, monitoring stations, by the Canadian Broadcasting Corp.; the Australian Broadcasting Corp. and many the Ausother similiar sources. Our Regional Monitoring Network is doing yeoman ser-vice in supplying important information that is in turn passed on to the proper sources. We wish to continue to do our share, that is to supply the most complete and accurate shortwave statistics possible. To do this we need the help of every member. Make it a habit to listen in just as often as possible; to take notes on what you hear, to send these notes to us. We will do the rest.

To continue this service; to continue our publication takes funds. Our one and only source of revenue is the small yearly subscription fee for the GLOBE CIRCLER. With many members in the armed services this revenue is greatly reduced. We ask your cooperation in three ways. 1) by paying your renewal promptly (whether you are dxing now or not); 2) by recommending our publication to anyone interested in shortwave reception; 3) by making a small contribution when, and if, possible-

EDITORIAL

As the war spreads over more and more territory, we are reminded of many friends who live in these places. In the Philippines we had at least one hundred members during our period of existence. In Burma, the chief of the Educational Department succeeded in getting over two hundred members for us. In Singapore, Java, Medan, Hong Kong and even in Japan we had many members. It is little wonder then that we have periods of despondency when we think of the suffering and pain subjected on these people.

It is also remindful to us that we are not able to continue our work as we have in the past. When our own great nation, The United States of America, entered the war, it meant that radio factories had to jump to the aid of our fighting forces and turn out army and navy material. It also meant that many of our members had to give up their listening posts to take up arms for our country. As a result, we find that we are not able to carry on our work on the basis as when the world was at peace, or

even as before the United States entered the war.

Therefore, friends, it becomes necessary for me to say that hereafter this paper will be published only irregularly.
