

- 25.—The highest peaks in human life are not obtained by getting, but rather by giving. What you do for yourself dies with you; what you do for others lives forever.
- 26.—Faith in the other fellow is one thing that will go a long way toward making realistic the good neighbor idea.
- 27.—If you want to be interesting to the people among whom you live then be interested in them.
- 28.—The people in the country where we live are facing a new day. They are making new demands. Our thinking must be ajusted to these conditions. We can not go on thinking in terms of yesterday and hope to keep pace with a changing world.
- 29.—If through our efforts we share in helping others to produce more, earn more and live better, our presence will be a gift from heaven in any country.
- 30.—Nothing is more effective or rates higher with Latin Americans than what we term little things-little attentions, little kindnesses, little courtesies, little favors, little rememberances-make use of them.
- 31.—Because we respect ourselves, we respect the rights of others. This is a fundamental reaction of the good neighbor idea.
- 32.—We may be interested in our rights, but let us remember that our rights cease when they spell exploitation or unduly burden our fellow men.
- 33.—It would be hard to imagine anything worse than for a foreign resident to attract attention because of his lack of interest in the country where he resides.
- 34.—If we can not live helpfully among the people where we are, and if there is lacking in our hearts a spirit of cooperation and good will, then we may well doubt the wisdom of our having put down stakes in a country where good neighbors are needed.

- 35.--The kind of residents foreign countries are seeking today are those who desire to be rivers, not reservoirs.
- 36.—Good intentions are fine, but they must be made real through our treatment of those around us.
- 37.—We owe something for the protection and privileges we receive while living in a country that is not our own, and in which we are only guests. We would be ungrateful indeed not to find some way of acknowledging our indebtedness.
- 38.—Being a good neighbor is something that should be demonstrated by our life, our attitude, our words and our practices.
- 39.—Good will is something that can not be created over night. Ploughing, planting, cultivating-and then the harvest.
- 40.—Genuine friendship is the only cement that will permanently bind together the people of this hemisphere in the days that are ahead.
- 41.—The good neighbor policy may be the hope of new day, the forerunner of lasting peace and friendly cooperation, but it also may become a shadow without substance, if we fail to put life into it and give what is needed to make it effective.
- 42.—No group can do more toward making the good neighbor policy effective than the thousands of American citizens who reside in Latin American countries.
- 43.—With the success or failure of the good neighbor policy may be decided the future destiny of this hemisphere. It is just that important. Can your cooperation be counted upon for the accomplishment of a big task, an urgent task, and one that will make history.



How U. S. Citizens Residing in Latin American Countries

May Cooperate in Making a Better America.

OR forty years the author of this article, has lived in Mexico and has been closely identified with the life of the country.





The following orientations have been prepared with the sincere desire to cooperate in creating better inter-american relations and with the hope of being helpful to those who are anxious to share in making realistic the good neighbor policy.

This article, presented in a laconic manner, offers a few basic principles that underlie good understanding and better international relationships. It emphasizes the fact that the good neighbor idea is more than a theory of government. It is a plan of action for men of good will.

- 1.—Know the language of the country in which you live. This should have priority over other things and its importance could hardly be over-estimated. One of the highest compliments we may pay to the people among whom we live is to speak their language correctly.
- Know the background of the country's history, acquire a knowledge of its heroes and outstanding accomplishments, and familiarize yourself with its literature and art.
- Endeavor to understand those among whom you live. Understanding a people is the first step toward liking them.

- 4.—Remember that those about you are different from you in their customs, traditions, culture, background and their version of life. If you do not take this into account, you will always be a square pegtrying to fit into a round hole.
- 5.—Identify yourself with the people, show interest in their lives and activities, and make friends among them. Friendship will always prove your best connecting link with people of another nationality.
- 6.—Look for the best in those with whom you live. Some people walk over gold and trample over diamonds but see nothing. The ability to see the best in others is the highest of human gifts.
- 7.—Do not criticize or make unfavorable comparisons. If occasionally criticism seems necessary, let it be constructive, and see to it that it is not made in an offensive way.
- Avoid an assumption of superiority and especially in those lands where the trend is toward a society without classes.
- In your character as guest, do not try to tell others how to run the government; avoid mixing up in the country's policital affairs.
- 10.—Do not speak disparagingly of the country where you reside. No man likes to hear his native land defamed.
- 11.—Keep in mind that the country in which you make your living has a claim upon your gratitude.
- 12.—Where praise is deserved, do not fail to give it. The results are always worth while.
- 13.—Cooperate in the social and economic development of the country. Share in its philantropic, humanitarian and cultural activities.

- 14.—Do not expect things to be the same in a foreign country as in your own. Nations are made by different patterns. Sometimes what is meat for one may be poison to another.
- 15.—If we will lift up the banner of kindly, friendly and unselfish service in the community where we live, we will merit the respect and highest consideration of those whom we desire to be our friends.
- 16.—The good neighbor policy means unity, harmony and friendly relations. The other alternative is discord, antagonisms, misunderstanding and hate.
- 17.—We get no where by making people feel small and insignificant, but we add a glow to our own feelings and win everlasting gratitude when we help others touch the stars.
- 18.—We should not expect to enjoy the priviliges extented us by another country without heartily responding to the obligations they entail.
- 19.—A smile will go a long way toward creating goodwillmake use of it. It is the same in any language.
- 20.—In our contacts with people, it is well to bear in mind that it is not the kind of clothes on the body but the spirit in the heart that counts.
- 21.—People have a right to be suspicious of our motives, if we talk one way and act another. Lips and life must be in harmony.
- 22.—Watch your attitude. It may create a dislike for you, or even stir up hatred toward your country. Avoid being cynical.
- 23.—The practice of democratic fairness in our personal and business affairs would make a world of difference in the effectiveness of inter-american relations.
- 24.—Show the real spirit of a good neighbor by acting toward others in a way that will help them.






