FREDERICK, MARYLAND HOME of BARBARA FRITCHIE



Barbara Fritchie House.

Each year thousands of visitors from all parts of the world come to Frederick to visit the little house on West Patrick Street—one block from the Francis Scott Key Hotel—from whose attic window a frail old lady, Barbara Fritchie, shouted defiance to the Confederate Army as it passed by.

Barbara Fritchie was a devout Union sympathizer and from the beginning of the war to her death constantly displayed the Union flag from her attic window. Despite warnings to remove it upon approach of the Men in Grey, she never took down the flag she loved.

It was in the late summer of 1862 that Stonewall Jackson and his army occupied Frederick. They passed by the house and tradition says that the old lady refused to remove the flag she idolized. Whittier has immortalized the episode with all the ardor and glamor befitting the war period in which it was enacted.

The house is open to the public and contains many of her priceless relics—her clothing and furniture, interesting old chinaware and numerous other things of interest to the history lover. Its proximity to the Francis Scott Key Hotel enables visitors to conveniently walk to the house after their evening dinner or prior to their morning trip.
