




MALCOLM ARCHARD



GEORGE SCHNABEL



Here he is, folks - by popular demand! It has always been interesting how one person can picture another in his mind only to find the image vastly different when a picture or the real person is finally seen. Dan has been with NASWA a good number of years, first accepting responsibility of Log Report to provide renewed stability and accuracy after a shaky period when the former Log Report Editor, Del Hirst of Texas, retired ill.

Dan Ferguson - NASWA's Executive Editor Dan was pursuing graduate studies and teaching on the side in Miami all the while he managed Log Report, and where he also published the first of his acclaimed 60 meter surveys. Returning to home in Charleston, W. Va., Dan continued the excellent administration of Log Report and later, Listener's Notebook. NASWA's former Executive Editor, Bill Eddings, had suffered severe heart ailments with complications and in March 1972, Dan Ferguson accepted the publishing responsibilities from Ed Shaw, then temporarily publishing FRENDX by mimeograph method. The following summer, upon death of Bill Eddings, Dan also accepted the executive responsibility for NASWA, and our club continues to outshine all others. In the photo above, we see Dan testing a recently purchased HQ-145 (used) which backs up his Heath SB-310. In addition, he uses a Heath Scanalyzer to "see" signals on a scope. Although QSLs have been of only mild interest, Dan has logged approximately 180 countries and favors the 60 meter band DX. Dan is a devoted husband and father, active in church and on campus where he teaches math at Morris Harvey College. Member of several clubs, including one fraternity of exceptionally dedicated and experienced DXers, Dan is probably one of the few North American DXers who can tune a receiver left-handed while balancing a globe on his head.

Jerry's another long-time NASWA member - as far back as I can remember. During his hobby career, he has wrung some 275 QSLs out of 130 countries. We bet there are some tall tales you could tell us in those years of DX, Jer. works in the emergency room at a local hospital in his home town of Lawton, Oklahoma.
