
Philately and Cable & Wireless


Cable & Wireless, the British overseas telecommunications company, played a "behind the scenes" role in connection with a number of shortwave targets of the past. Years ago they were the transmitter operator for the Seychelles Broadcasting Service and the Aden Broadcasting Service. They have also carried special programming for various broadcasting stations, e.g. weather reports from Turks Island, cricket matches from <u>Barbados</u>, and broadcast programming from Jamaica and Bermuda. They are probably best known for the Radio St. Helena day broadcasts. It appears that, in the case of Kenya, Cable & Wireless station VQ7LO openly carried out the full responsibilities of station operation from the early 1930s to 1959, when the Kenya Broadcasting Service took over. They were listed in the World Radio Handbook under their own name (see 1957 ed., below). It may be the only case where Cable & Wireless operated as a traditional "broadcaster."





































"SEPARATION" (above center) refers to the secession of Anguilla from St. Kitts & Nevis in 1980.
