Iowa City, 775 Miles Away, Picks Up Special Nov. 1 Broadcast from Pine Lodge

When Robert W. Gorsuch of Cedar Rapids, Ia., twisted the dial on his livingroom radio set early on the morning of Nov. 1, he tuned in on a station more than 775 airline miles away. The station was WWNY in Watertown.

The quality, according to Mr. Gorsuch's message to WWNY officials today, was good and the signal clear.

As a matter of fact, Mr. Gorsuch had heard of Watertown before. His grandfather went west 85 years ago, to Iowa, from Sackets Harbor.

WWNY has received 36 reports from 14 states on the special "DX" broadcast of Nov. 1, which went out from Pine Lodge. The test show featured music by John Urban's 16-piece orchestra and the Glenn Fults sextet. James W. Higgins, who supervised the program, and Charles Pierce, wrote the show and were masters of ceremony.

Other announcers participating were Gene Grant, Lyman Manser, Bob Telford and Vern Wenderoff. Mrs. Helen McCaul was the vocalist with the orchestra.

The 775-mile extreme distance point proved a bit disappointing to the station officials, but it was a bad night in the east and mid-west with many natural, rather than man-made, interferences, such as static caused by fog and other atmospheric elements.

Here are some of the comments received of a non-technical nature:

Ted Weiser, Schuylkill Haven, Pa.—"Signal clear, program good and interesting."

Elbert Tewell, Carey, O.—"Much natural static, but signal good."

Arnold E. Gerard, Miamisburg, O.—"Signal good; some interference from WEUS in Florida."

Herbert Campbell, Athens, Pa.—"High noise level, but signal strong and good." Mr. Campbell also remarked about the WWNY "DX" program of Nov. 5, 1941.

Robert J. Gilchrist, Watervliet "Swell show, good signal."

Dick Wharton, Chicago, Ill.—"Excellent fidelity, full frequency response, good listening."

Alan E. Arnold, Milwaukee, Wis.—"Atmospheric conditions bad, but signal understandable. Appreciated the program because it was different from DX shows put on by most stations."

John T. Tweedie, Oakhurst, N. J.—"Excellent volume, 100 per cent modulation, natural static was extremely heavy."

Vincent C. Stasen, Philadelphia, Pa.—"Good program, really enjoyed it, signal very strong."

David F. Thomas, Proctorville, O.—"Listened on car radio between Proctorville and Huntington, W. Va. Very nice signal."

WWNY had often been heard in his home, but this was the first time it had been heard in a car in two states.

Stanwood R. Morss, Bradford, Mass.—"An excellent show."

William J. Prater, Grimsley, Tenn.—"Strong signal strength, but extremely heavy static. Tone quality excellent, some interference from WEUS, Eustis, Fla., but WWNY signal was stronger. Program was sure different from the usual run of DX programs."

Bernard Duffy, Staten Island—"One of the most elaborate, interesting and entertaining 'specials' that our organizations were ever favored with."

Joe Pelletier, Altoona, Pa., engineer at WVAM, Altoona—"Very entertaining program."

Leo Herz, Chicago, Ill.—Mr. Herz last heard WWNY in 1941, "since then much water over dam, three years in army with 101st Airborne, signal fair, much static due to dense fog."

Len Kruse, Dubuque, Ia.—"Good signal, no interference whatever; Dubuque is approximately 750 airline miles from Watertown." It was the first time he had ever heard WWNY.

TIMELY TIPS ON TUNING TOUGHIES VI - "DO UNTO OTHERS."

Yes, that's the opening phrase of the Golden Rule, and it applies in all walks of life of course, but it certainly also applies to the DX hobby.
